MESSAGE FROM THE FINA PRESIDENT



President Dr. Julio C. Maglione (URU)

A very rich four-year period!

The last four years of the FINA history were a very rewarding period. The FINA family could enjoy many successes and achievements, was happy to celebrate many Stars in the pool, and had the opportunity to witness great competitions in outstanding locations.

We can proudly say that **FINA in 2017 is stronger**, more important and more recognised worldwide than in 2013. This outcome was achieved by working all together, in a spirit of unity.

With our 208 National Federations, our Technical Committees and the efficiency of our staff in the Lausanne headquarters.

At Olympic level, the importance of Aquatics in the Games programme was very recently confirmed with the approval by the IOC Executive Board of three new swimming events for Tokyo 2020.

By then, and for the first time in history, FINA will be the International Federation with the highest number (49) of medal events in the Olympics.

This is a great responsibility for us. But, strong from the experience of the last two editions of the Games – London 2012 and Rio 2016 – where our Sport was the most followed on TV screens and reached the highest penetration in digital platforms, we are confident that we will continue being successful.

Another sign of this vitality and recognition was the improvement in the number of teams for the water polo women's tournament, from eight to 10.

FINA had done additional requests concerning the Olympic programme and we remain confident that those are valid proposals. With perseverance and presenting the right arguments, we are sure that in the future more events, and who knows a new discipline – high diving -, will be part of the Olympic celebration.

These achievements are mainly due to the outstanding reach and popularity of our **World Championships**.

The last two editions of our showcase were memorable! In Barcelona 2013 and Kazan 2015, our aquatic disciplines displayed an enormous vitality and many new events made their entry in the programme.

High Diving is now an exciting and spectacular discipline in the FINA calendar, while mixed events in Swimming, Diving, and Synchronised Swimming also brought additional excitement to the fans worldwide.

This effort was well rewarded by all those following our competitions. In Kazan 2015, 6.8 billion cumulative TV viewers followed the action in the capital of Tatarstan. An unprecedented figure, highlighting the attractiveness of our programme and the reach of our Stars and their superb performances.

Another milestone related to our World Championships is the joint organisation of the FINA World Masters Championships, immediately after the elite competition. Introduced for the first time in 2015, this novelty proved to be highly successful and will be the reference to follow in the years to come.

This year in Budapest (HUN), the FINA family is ready to have a great Aquatic Festival and the Magyar capital will live an unforgettable summer at the rhythm of our disciplines!

FINA has also put a lot effort in consolidating this growth. We have improved the **financial assistance to the National Federations**, their athletes and officials, taking part at the FINA World Championships, and we have also increased the amount of prize money paid to the best athletes in the competition.

This strategy also brought positive consequences in our **FINA World Swimming Championships (25m)**. More stars and more National Federations are taking part in this event, now organised in conjunction with the **FINA World Aquatics Convention**.

This was also an innovation of this four-year period, which proved very successful. Delegates and exhibitors from all over the world have now the opportunity to network and exchange their experiences, while enjoying the performances of the best swimmers of the planet.

The addition of the **Coaches Swimming Golden Clinic** to the programme of the Convention is another highlight, aimed at unveiling the keys for success of our champions, by those who train and prepare them, their coaches.

Another top-level annual event was added to our calendar, the **FINA World Aquatics Gala – Soirée des Etoiles.** Organised in conjunction with the FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) and FINA World Aquatics Convention on even years, this rendezvous is a stand-alone event in odd years.

The idea behind it is to pay a fair tribute to the stars of our Sport, recognising the best athletes in each of our six disciplines, both in the men and women category. After the first three editions, this initiative is already a great achievement and became a prestigious opportunity to present the vitality and strength of our International Federation.

FINA is working very hard to enhance the importance, visibility and promotion of all **other competitions** in Swimming, Water Polo, Diving, Synchronised Swimming, Open Water Swimming and High Diving. Our annual calendar now includes top-events in each of these disciplines, which are able to attract great athletes, generate superb performances and distribute a considerable amount of prize money.

Besides the sport competitions, FINA's priority on **Development areas** has also consistently improved.

We have substantially raised our economic input on those programmes and many areas are now covered: scholarships for athletes, coaches certification programmes, seminars, clinics and schools for coaches and officials. This effort has led to encouraging results and this grassroots strategy enabled new National Federations to develop quickly and sometimes reach the top of the world hierarchy in our competitions.

Moreover, FINA has also undertook decisive steps in a new and very important initiative: the **"Swimming for All, Swimming for Life" programme.** Every year, more than 350,000 human lives are lost due to drowning. This is basically happening because these people hadn't any familiarity with swimming. As guardian of Aquatics, FINA could not remain insensitive to these tragic numbers: swimming is not only a sport, it is a basic life-saving skill – as stated by UNESCO/ CIGEPS resolutions

That is why we launched this programme, aimed at reducing these dramatic figures and we count on the help of various partners in this effort. The idea is to closely work with our National Federations so that they can efficiently implement in their countries, in co-operation with their respective national governments, learn-to-swim programmes to their children and youth, thus raising the global levels of acquaintance with water, but also improving the volume of physical activity in the five continents.

Celebrating all these successes is also part of FINA's objectives.

Our **communication strategy** has equally evolved during this period.

The FINA website, the number 1 portal to get Aquatics information, was rebuilt and is now presenting a more friendly and fan-based approach. Social media platforms have also progressed and are now a valuable source of information and entertainment for our supporters worldwide. FINA news are now available everywhere, anytime, on every mobile platform. Recently, a new OTT (Over-the-top) platform was launched in time for the World Championships in Hungary, giving access to the subscribers of the TV player to live and on-demand content about FINA competitions, but also about their stars and behind-the-scene features.

Throughout this four-year period, we faced enormous challenges in relation with doping, governance and integrity.

Doping is still a succession of battles. The cheaters in our sport know that from this side of the barrier we are 100% determined in eradicating doping from our sport. Counting on the precious help of WADA and IOC, and strictly applying our rules on this matter, FINA remains at the forefront of this battle in terms of the sport international environment.

We are ready, as it was the case in the past, with our best experts, our advanced technology and our will to demonstrate that Aquatics is a drug-free sport and that the huge majority of our competitors are clean.

In a spirit of **democracy and transparency**, we have also progressed in the fields of good **governance and integrity**. Voted by our delegates in the General Congress, our Constitutional rules have been improved and adapted to a 21st century administration of FINA. A **Code of Ethics** and an **Ethics Panel** were created to revise all internal procedures and solve all cases possibly connected with conflict of interest or violation of integrity principles. FINA has now all the tools to ensure that its administrators and officials act in good faith, in accordance with ethic values.

We were happy to move, in September 2016, to our **new headquarters in Lausanne.** For the first time in its rich history, FINA now owns its office and has acquired a beautiful property in the centre of the Olympic capital, where the activities of our administration and the work of our staff can be done with greater efficiency. We will officially inaugurate it in a few months, with the presence of all our Members. It is never too much to repeat: FINA exists and works for its National Federations. We are nothing without our 208 bodies in the five continents. They are the pillar of our existence and deserve our praise and admiration when wrapping-up the last four years of FINA activity.

We have worked hard, relentlessly, aiming at the best for our athletes. We are a big family, we all respect each other and we progress united.


We have done a lot, but there is much more to achieve together.

COMPETITIONS OLYMPIC GAMES

RIO 2016

Swimming was a big winner in Rio once more, as it retained its top ranking among the Olympic sports in all fields – and parallel, the US swimming team also belonged among the great winners as they brought home half of the titles on offer (16 out of 32). They were dominant within the whole US delegation, as 16 of their 46 golds came from the swimmers and 33 of their 121 total medals. Just to give another example of how high the Americans flew in the pool, their swimmers were more successful than the whole team of the next Olympic host, Japan.

And this is not thanks only to the two geniuses, Michael Phelps (who retired – finally? – with an unparalleled total of 28 Olympic medals, including 23 gold!) and Katie Ledecky, the latter many consider an athlete who might become equally great among the women (Katie's efforts were also phenomenal, she broke two world records, she gained 11 seconds on the others in the 800m free final).

More and more new aces graced the scene, one of the biggest hits of all was Ryan Murphy who won both the backstroke events and added a WR in the opening leg of the medley relay. And hopefully we are allowed to regard the efforts of Simone Manuel as even more important, as her wonderful victory (even if tied with Canada's Penny Oleksiak in the 100m free) made her the first Afro- American Olympic champion in swimming.

The other disciplines also offered a flood of brilliant stories in Rio. The Chinese super divers brought their very best to the boards and to the pool. Tania

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Cagnotto, the Italian diva, crowned an outstanding career by adding the one last missing item to a treasury rich in world and European medals: she collected two Olympic medals, the ones which had eluded her in the previous five editions.

And even if the weather was a bit unsettled for several days it didn't cause any fuss for synchro greats Svetlana Romashina and Natalia Ishchenko, who both captured their fifth Olympic golds to join Russian compatriot Anastasia Davydova in the history books as the most decorated swimmers this sport has ever seen.

The Rio Olympics were historic in water polo as well, as we witnessed the first successful title defence in the women's tournament, by the US side. Pressure was also sitting and putting weight on the backs of the Serbian players in the men's water polo but in the end the eventual winners managed to get rid of it. Despite kicking off the Games disastrously, once they were back on track they showed the same overwhelming form which had brought them loads of titles in the previous years and finally the Olympic gold, upon their sixth try.

At the Copacabana beach, despite the challenges prior to the Games, there were zero problems with the water. And of course the competitions were run in order, producing fantastic Dutch triumphs and, just as importantly: no one contacted any virus, nor any illness.

In swimming, 18 nations earned at least a medal and 13 clinched gold; in all the aquatic disciplines, athletes from 23 countries reached the podium and 15 of those had at least one standing on top.

Altogether 174 NOCs – a new record-, plus a Refugee Team took part in the aquatics competitions and positive examples came from Kazakhstan



and Singapore (courtesy of the 200m breast champion Dmitry Balandin and Joseph Schooling, winner of the 100m fly).

As in London 2012, the FINA events represented an added-value to the Olympic programme, and following an independent study from the IOC on the impact of each Sport in the Games, the conclusions were as follows:

- Out of all Olympic sports, Aquatics generated the most interest from the global public with Swimming particularly popular amongst the Youth;
- Broadcast of Aquatics events was consumed in huge numbers with 3.8x as many total viewer hours than the average Olympic sport;
- Digital traffic was particularly strong, with more internet searches and page views for Aquatics content than any other sport;
- Aquatics events delivered an excellent experience for the fans with the organisation, excitement, quality and clarity of the sports exceptionally well rated;
- Across all 5 disciplines, 76% of fans were attending their first Aquatics event, well above the overall Olympic average of 62%.

Unsurprisingly, this success led to more success. On June 9, 2017 the IOC announced the programme of the 2020 Olympic Games in Tokyo and decided to add three additional swimming events: the 800m free for men, the 1500m free for women, and a mixed 4x100m medley relay. This way, FINA will have, for the first time in history, the highest number of medal events (49) of all sports in the Olympic programme. Moreover, the IOC decided to increase the number of teams in the women's water polo tournament, from eight to 10.

FINA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

BARCELONA 2013

Planet Water. Barcelona was for 16 days the water capital of the world. In line with its motto, the Catalan capital welcomed the best athletes of the six FINA disciplines, including for the first time High Diving. Four venues were used, 177 nations were present, 2,195 competitors made the trip to these World Championships, more than 270,000 spectators watched the events live and many hundreds of millions could enjoy at home the outstanding TV images provided by the Host Broadcaster, TVE. Barcelona and the whole of Spain could vibrate with the 12 medals of the host country, including incredible performances from its synchronised swimmers, the gold medal of its



women's water polo team and the superb results of Mireia Belmonte.

Variety and universality are the key words to define the 15th FINA World Championships in Barcelona (ESP). From July 19 to August 4, pool and open water swimmers, water polo players, pool and high divers and synchronised swimmers highlighted the competition and proved that the post-Olympic year was not poorer in outstanding performances. Many stars confirmed their credentials but many others made their appearance at the highest level. The venues were also magnificent, mixing outdoor and indoor facilities, temporary and permanent pools. Even the weather helped the celebration of Aquatics in Barcelona: the sun was always present and the gentle but appreciated breeze from the sea softened the sensation of heat. Thirty-one countries had their best athletes on the podium and the anthems of 19 nations were heard at the competition sites.

In the Village of the championships, an area where FINA and Organising Committee sponsors had their commercial stands, thousands of people could eat, listen to music and party until late in the night. The sporting performances of the FINA athletes were accompanied by a thrilling social experience, by which the entire city was mobilised. From the airport to the main avenues of Barcelona, the promotion of the championships was always present and the majority of the people in the streets knew that their city was staging a great Aquatic Festival.

Outside the FINA sphere, many personalities and VIPs wanted to be associated with the 15th FINA World Championships and the VIP stands in the venues were packed with guests attracted by the magic of FINA disciplines.

The main novelty at these FINA World Championships was the introduction of a new discipline in the programme: **High Diving**. Thirteen men and six women took the plunge from the 27m and 20m platforms respectively in the port of Barcelona for three exciting and unforgettable days.

Among the men, the international star in this discipline, Orlando Duque, from Colombia, confirmed his status as favourite and, at 38, became the first men's world champion in High Diving. He was followed by another experienced and talented athlete, Britain's Gary Hunt, while 23-year-old Jonathan Paredes, from Mexico, got the bronze. In the women's field, two US divers dominated operations, with Cesilie Carlton clinching gold, in front of her team-mate Ginger Huber. Anna Bader, from Germany, completed this first world championship podium.

In both events, the spectacular character of this new discipline enchanted the thousands of spectators who were at the Port Vell to be part of history. Barcelona 2013 was definitively a milestone for FINA and for its Aquatic sports – the greatness of our athletes and the quality of their performances wrote more golden pages in all our disciplines. As the famous song at the 1992 Olympic Games held in this friendly Mediterranean city said, FINA and Barcelona have definitively become "Amics per sempre"!

KAZAN 2015

The first thing to retain when remembering the two outstanding weeks of the 16th FINA World Championships is that never before has this Aquatic Festival been so universal: in Kazan, the dynamic capital of Tatarstan, no fewer than 184 nations took part in FINA's showcase event, an unprecedented figure in our history. The previous best had been the 2011 Shanghai (CHN) rendezvous, when 178 national federations were present.

If the number of countries is already a cause of satisfaction for FINA, the 2,416 competitors in Kazan also constitute a successful figure. This figure is second to the previous best, established in Rome 2009, but also proves that in all aquatic disciplines (except water polo, where there is a fixed number of 16 teams for both the men's and women's tournaments), there was a growing number of nations and athletes reaching the world level.

Swimming is worth mentioning here, as despite the introduction of qualification times in 2011, more and more national federations are able to send their best representatives – 1,217 swimmers were in Kazan, a number that combines the athletes achieving "A" and "B" times with the ones entered through Universality places.

This variety of nations and this quantity of athletes has naturally had an effect when considering the final medals table. No fewer than 31 countries from the five continents reached the podium in Kazan (equalling the previous best in Barcelona 2013), proving that universality is also a reality when we consider the world's top athletes. If we look at this number more attentively, we can see that three countries have gained medals for the first time ever at the FINA World Championships:

DPR Korea obtained one gold and one bronze in the diving, while Singapore and

Jamaica collected their first medals, thanks to the respective efforts of Joseph Schooling and Alia Atkinson in the swimming. Argentina also picked up its first pool swimming award, though it had already medalled at the Worlds in open water action. 75 was another number to be retained in Kazan. This figure corresponds to the number of medal events at stake, a record in the already rich programme of the FINA World Championships. In fact, the 2015 edition was highlighted by the introduction of new events, namely the mixed events in three disciplines: swimming, diving and synchronised swimming.

In the latter, it represented the end of an era in which only women were represented in the sport. The mixed duets in synchro made the headlines in Kazan and were massively followed by the media worldwide and by the enthusiastic spectators in the stands.

Another milestone in Kazan was the considerable improvement in prize money for the best athletes in the competition. This policy, started in 2007, initially covered only the medallists in each event, but a significant step forward was made in Barcelona 2013, with the first six ranked competitors/teams being rewarded.

For 2015, this was further improved, with the prize money reaching all the eight finalists in each event, for a total sum of US\$ 5.5 million going to our best competitors. If we add the US\$ 30,000 paid for each world record in the swimming events – and there were 12 in Russia – we get close to prize money reaching US\$ 6 million.

Finally, the mobilisation of the Kazan population was also amazing at these FINA World Championships and generated more interesting figures: no fewer than 316,000 tickets were sold for the competitions – many sessions in the different venues of the Championships were in fact sold out – and more than 40,000 tickets went for the amazing Opening Ceremony, a show which was repeated for a week, to the delight of the local population.

All these numbers and figures confirm the success of Kazan 2015, both from a sporting and an organisational point of view. They also prove the effort put in place by FINA and the efficient Organising Committee to set up a true Aquatic Festival. To best reward these efforts, FINA was happy to report that, following a study conducted by British company Kantar Media, the FINA World Championships held in Kazan cumulated a record aggregated global TV viewership of 6.8 billion (total cumulative audience -6,840,601,835). This official figure represents a 2.3 billion increase from Barcelona 2013, where the audience was 4.5 billion. Moreover, in for the Catalonian showcase, there was a total of 5,156 hours of dedicated coverage, while Kazan 2015 generated 5,728 hours. The cumulative audience is based on six platforms: Live Audience, Delayed, Repeat, Highlights, News and Sports Magazine content.



FINA WORLD SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS (25M)

DOHA 2014

In five days of exciting competition, there are many images staying in our minds. Winners, losers, records, close finishes, emotion during award ceremonies... The 12th FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) held in Doha (QAT) from December 3-7, 2014 were made of these and much more.

Registering a record of participation, with 950 swimmers coming from 172 nations, the event was also impressive in terms of performances: no less than 23 World Records were set, largely improving the previous maximum of 18 best global marks, established in Manchester (GBR), in 2008. From this list, 14 WR were in individual events while nine were improved in the relays. The women side was more prolific in this statistic, with 15 new WR, against eight in the men's field

Individually, and some days after being awarded the title of FINA Best Swimmers in 2014, Chad Le Clos (RSA) and Katinka Hosszu (HUN) took the spotlight in Doha. At the conclusion of the five-day competition, the South African star and the Magyar champion received the Trophy for the Best Male and Female Swimmer of the competition.

Doha 2014 was also marked by the introduction of six new relay events: the men's and women's 4x50m free and 4x50m medley, and the mixed 4x50m free and 4x50m medley. Still on the women's side, Netherlands (4x50m, 4x100m and 4x200m) dominated operations in the free relays (always in WR time), while Denmark (4x50m and 4x100m) won the gold in medley action (also setting a WR in the 4x50m medley).

Brazil topped the medal chart with a total 10 awards, seven of them gold. The results of Hosszu largely contributed to the second position of Hungary in the medal distribution with six gold, three silver and two bronze. The top-five was completed by the Netherlands (5 gold, 1 silver and 6 bronze), South Africa (4 gold, 1 silver) and Spain (4 gold, all going to Belmonte)

The Team Trophy of the Championships was presented to the United States with their team finishing the competition with the highest number medals: 17 (2 gold, 9 silver and 6 bronze).

WINDSOR 2016

The FINA World Swimming Championships (25m), organised in Canada's southernmost city were highlighted by the nine medals – seven gold and two silver – for Katinka Hosszu (HUN), and four – three gold and one silver – for Chad le Clos RSA), who also set the only individual world record, in the 100m butterfly. The competition also marked the resurrection for Park Tae-hwan (KOR) – three gold, two Asian and three championship records. Federica Pellegrini (ITA),

Marco Koch (GER) and Radoslaw Kawecki (POL) returned to winning ways in their signature 200m events, respectively in freestyle, breaststroke and backstroke.

On an individual level the title of the "Best Swimmer" went to Hosszu. The Hungarian's hoard of nine medals was more than the total achieved by Italy and many other countries: an unprecedented tally which, added to her triumphs in the World Cup, confirmed Hosszu's status as queen of the short course.

"The man of the championships" could only be South Africa's Le Clos, butterfly king with his 50, 100, 200m golden treble, his second in succession at the short-course Worlds, plus a silver in the 200m freestyle. Most importantly, he improved his own world record in the 100m butterfly, the only individual world mark of the championships.

Former Olympic champion Park Tae-hwan (KOR) returned to the top of the podium. Park won three gold medals – 200, 400 and 1500m freestyle. He even made the final in the 100 free.

American Kelsi Worrell, who swept all three women's butterfly silver medals, setting a continental record in each event, was also remarkable.

Italian star Federica Pellegrini also shone in Windsor, claiming the 200m freestyle title. She won in her own way, beating with an irresistible finish a dangerous challenger, Hosszu. This come-frombehind win over Hosszu in the 200 free on the first night in Windsor was the first-ever shortcourse world title in her extraordinary

long career, which began in 2004, at the Athens Olympics, with a silver medal. Her victory was meaningful, although in Windsor the three medallists of Rio (Katie

Ledecky, Sarah Sjostrom and Emma McKeon) were missing.

Germany's Marco Koch and Poland's Radoslaw Kawecki also returned to the top of the podium after missing out in Rio. In Windsor both took a kind of revenge: Kawecki dominated the 200m backstroke; Koch, who was at his best, took gold in both the 100m and the 200m breaststroke, his signature event (in the latter he broke the shortcourse world record weeks before Windsor).

Dutchman Jesse Puts, 22, won gold in the men's 50m freestyle, while Lithuania's Simonas Bilis, 23, earned the top spot on the podium in the men's 100m freestyle. Seventeen-year-old Michael Andrew earned the only US men's gold medal of the Windsor championships, holding off Japanese world 400m IM champion Daiya Seto in the 100m individual medley.

Out of a total of 46 events, 12 relay events were contested, six 4x50, four 4x100 and two 4x200m. Gold medals were shared by three countries: Russia claimed half of them (6), the United States (4) and Canada (2). The relay events were Russia's stronghold - no gold in the individual events – and pulled the country up to third place in the medal standings.

Only two world records were established in Windsor, one men's, one women's. The women's record was set on December 7 by the United States in the 4x50m medley relay with a time of 1:43.27 for the quartet of Alexandra de Loof, Lilly King, Kelsi Worrell and Katrina Konopk.

The only individual world record was set the next day, December 8, by Chad le

Clos. The South African, in great form, won the 100m butterfly in 48.08.

On top of the medal table, as usual, the United States, although they participated with a largely second-string squad, with no Rio Olympic individual gold medallists except 100m breaststroke champion Lilly King. In total, the USA won 30 medals – 8 gold, 15 silver, 7 bronze, with half of their golds in relay events.

Hungary was second with 11 medals, all in individual events, with 9 of them (7 gold) from just one swimmer, the amazingly versatile Katinka Hosszu. The tally of the Magyars was completed by two bronze medals in the men's events: one from Peter Bernek in the 400 freestyle, the other from David Verraszto in the 400m individual medley.

Russia was third with 14 medals, of which 6 gold, all in relay events, a good display of a collective power. In fourth place was South Africa with 5 medals – 4 (3 gold) from Chad le Clos – and in fifth place South Korea with 3, all gold, courtesy of "one man band" Park. The host country, Canada, was sixth with 8



medals overall. Their tally suffered from the lack of brilliance of their spearhead swimmer in Rio, Penny Oleksiak, who was third in her signature event, the 100m freestyle, in which she had claimed the Olympic title in Rio in a joint win with Simone Manuel of the US.

Japan was an interesting case: its good team was second only to the United States for total number of medals won, 15, but found itself in eighth place in the rankings since most of their medals, 11, were bronze.

ANNUAL TOP-EVENTS

In June 2017, six top annual events – one for each FINA discipline - were part of the FINA calendar. The FINA Swimming World Cup undertook its major change in the four-year period in 2013, when the first cluster of events (in Europe) took place immediately after the conclusion of the FINA World Championships in Barcelona (ESP). The scheduling of the first legs of the circuit in August is now well established and aims at maintaining the momentum and the athlete's focus after the conclusion of the FINA showcase event. Besides the constant improvement in the prize money – now distributed by leg, by cluster, and by the position in the overall ranking -, the World Cup is being constantly adapted to the needs of athletes and coaches. A new format will be established for the 2017 edition, whereby athletes with Olympic and world medals will have direct access to the finals in their pet events.

The Diving World Series is also able to attract the best competitors in the discipline and has made stops in iconic venues such as the "Water Cube" in Beijing, or the amazing aquatics complex in Dubai (UAE).

In synchronised swimming, the World Trophy model seemed to have reached its limit, and a new circuit was created in 2017, the FINA Synchronised Swimming World Series, integrating events that already existed on a national and regional level. This allows more opportunities for international participation of our synchro stars and also additional occasions to expose the discipline on TV.

The Water Polo World League remains an important competition, with the best teams fighting for the victory in the 8-squad Super Final of the competition. Both for men and women, the European preliminaries are played in a home and away basis, while teams from other continents gather for an Intercontinental Tournament, staged over a sixday period.

Open water also continued its steady evolution, with the prestigious FINA 10km Marathon Swimming World Cup gathering the best athletes of the planet, in a circuit comprising 8 to 10 legs in several continents. A mass event associated to each of these legs is now organised in conjunction with the elite races.

With the introduction of High Diving in the FINA programme, a new annual event is now taking place, since 2014: the FINA High Diving World Cup. Over a three-day competition, the best high divers in the World compete in outstanding environments and have a privileged opportunity to promote this discipline worldwide. It is worth noting that since 2013, there has been a huge improvement in participation numbers, both on men's and women's field.

Other FINA events include: Diving Grand Prix (annual), Open Water Swimming Grand Prix (annual), Water Polo Development Trophy (every odd year), Diving World Cup (every even year), Synchronised Swimming and Water Polo World Cups (every four years), and Olympic Qualification events in Synchro, Water Polo and Marathon Swimming.

JUNIOR AND MASTERS COMPETITIONS

Junior competitions remain a priority for FINA. In Swimming, the bi-annual World Junior Swimming Championships (now in odd years) attracts the future stars of the pool, while the same philosophy applies to Diving, Synchronised Swimming and Open Water Swimming. In Water Polo, to better match the age group reality worldwide, there are two categories: Youth (18 and under) and Junior (20 and under).

The FINA World Masters Championships, organised every two years, also suffered a major improvement, now being organised in conjunction with the elite FINA World Championships. This innovation was firstly put in place at the 2015 Kazan rendezvous and is to be implemented in future editions of the FINA's showcase.

The rationale behind this change is to offer the Masters community the opportunity to watch the elite competition, and perhaps more importantly, to use the superb facilities put in place for our elite athletes. This philosophy adds 10 additional days of Aquatic excitement in the host city of FINA's World Championships, with the obvious advantages related with tourism, social experience and synergies' advantage from one unique Organising Committee.

CONVENTION

As the only event of this calibre in the international marketplace, the FINA World Aquatics Convention continues to offer a unique opportunity to bring together the aquatics community responsible for shaping the Aquatic disciplines and guiding the sport through the 21st century. The success and popularity of the event is proven by the increasing attendance rates in the last two editions – 2014 and 2016. Besides the thrilling experience on site, the event is also heavily followed on digital and social media platforms.

The convention consists of an exhibition and conference providing the perfect balance of positioning delegates in front of key decision makers whilst gaining knowledge from leading experts within the world of aquatic sports. A social programme completes the convention package providing delegate networking tailored for developing lasting relationships.

The FINA Gold Medal Clinic is a series of seminars and workshops held over two days as part of the Convention frame. The Clinic provides an invaluable opportunity to exchange concepts, experience and knowledge with top-level coaches from some of swimming's most dominant nations who outline a comprehensive overview of coaching practices whilst sharing valuable expertise with delegates interested in developing elite swimming in their own country.

From 2014, the FINA World Aquatics Convention has been combined with the FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) to bring additional value and impact to the Host City.

ATHLETES' GALA

Initially organised by the FINA World Aquatics Magazine, the vote and celebration of the Best Athletes of the Year has now been dramatically improved. Since 2014, FINA organises an annual, prestigious Gala to recognise the merits of its stars in the six aquatic disciplines. Objective criteria have been established to determine the winners in each of the sports, and the public recognition of the Best Athletes is a successful entertaining show, where the FINA family can provide a fair tribute to those who excel at our competitions.

In order to enable Officials, Judges and Referees to officiate in FINA events such as FINA World Cups and FINA World Championships, they must attend a FINA School in their respective discipline and pass a final certification exam.


The FINA Schools are intended to train and certify Officials, Judges and Referees in five aquatic disciplines:

- FINA Swimming Schools for Officials - standardized programme held over duration of two days.
- FINA Open Water Swimming Schools for Officials - standardized programme held over duration of two days.
- FINA Synchronised Swimming Schools for Judges - standardized programme held over a duration of four days.
- FINA Diving Development
 SchoolsforJudges-basic development
 course held over a duration of two days,
 designed for individuals who have no
 prior diving judge's experience.
- FINA Diving Certification Schools for Judges - standardized programme held over a duration of 3 days, designed for experienced judges.
- FINA Water Polo Schools for Referees - standardized programme held over a duration of three days.







FINA Scholarships Programme Report 2014-2016



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FINA SCHOLARSHIPS PROGRAMME

The FINA Scholarship Programme offers the opportunity to obtain financial and technical assistance for one potential elite athlete selected and proposed by their respective NF.

The scholarship supports the athlete in his/her preparation and qualification for the 2015 FINA World Championships in Kazan (RUS), the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro (BRA) and the 2017 FINA World Championships in Budapest (HUN), with a particular focus on athletes and NFs with the greatest needs.



Programme Goals

The aim of the programme is to identify, qualify and prepare a limited number of athletes aspiring to participate in the FINA World Championships and in the Olympic Games.

As part of the development of the National Federations, preparing athletes for international competitions is crucial to their development and the future of the national teams.

When

The FINA Scholarships Programme was launched in June 2013. FINA provides since then annual scholarships for a duration of 3-12 months to a limited number of athletes.

The length of the scholarship depends to the athlete plan and the expectations of the FINA National Member Federation.





How

Every year FINA launches the "FINA Scholarships Programme application period", moment when all the FINA National Federation members can apply to award one of their athletes.

FINA provides assistance to the scholarship holders by supporting their NFs or by offering the opportunity to train in a high-level training centre.

DEVELOPMENT

Each National Federation receives the application form where they can select one of the possible training options (Training Centre or National Federation option) and present the credentials of the athlete (e.g. best results, age of the athlete, training plan that has been followed, feedbacks from the coach and motivation letter written by the athlete).





Who

FINA provides 40 scholarships per year and the programme is focused on those National Member Federations with greatest needs.

There are two main requirements:

 Only the Universality National Federations are allowed to apply for the programme.

• At least one of the best times of the athlete (performed in a competition) shall be between the B standard (entry time for WCH and OG) and the S Standard (+3% of the B Standard).

Long Term Programme (6-12 month duration)

For young athletes (under 23) who need a longer time to achieve the "B" standard

FINA decides in coordination with the relevant NF if the athlete will train in his/her home country or abroad in a high-level training centre. Factors to consider will be the needs of the athlete and his/her age.

The NF or the training centre will ensure that the athlete has:

- Access to appropriate training facilities.
- A specialised coach.
- Regular medical and scientific assistance and control.



Coaches from 14 countries, including Zambia, Croatia, Malaysia, Jamaica and Brunei, have since then benefited from the three-level certification programme, which aims at developing a universal terminology for coaches around the world.

Maglione sheds light on the international federation's current development strategy and how it has evolved overtime: "If, in the past, these programmes were essentially technical and focused on officials and coaches, we have now shifted to the core of the Aquatics protagonists, our Athletes. 

"FINA Targeting Rio 2016 - Scholarships Programme" Head Coach, Lopez, gave FINA an exclusive insight of the day-to-day training programme at Thanyapura:

How do you evaluate the progress and coaching in Thanyapura?

There has been a very obvious development in both training and competition, and all evaluations need to have a final goal: to make the best possible times in Rio. In terms of evaluations we have conducted lactate tests, strength and power tests, subjective evaluations based on perceived exertion, and many other tests. But the biggest showcase of improvement has been the fact that 100% of the participants have swam personal best times and broke over 50 national records in just 7 months.

On the other hand the compromise level is extraordinary. The group has developed a great team environment and great momentum, being very rarely if ever late, accepting their responsibility/accountability for their own performances-from perfect skills to individualised warm ups- and taking care of the other members first time ever any of these countries make it past of the FINA programme here in Thanyapura.

What does a day at Thanyapura with the athletes look like? What is the daily programme?

FINA Athletes' Scholarships: already a fruitful strategy

Khader Bagalah (JOR), Marcelo Jimenez (ESA) and Naomi Ruele (BOT) do not know each other. But they all share common characteristics: they are young swimmers, coming from countries not used to shine at the highest level; they benefit from the new FINA Athletes Scholarship programme and, as a consequence, they all bettered their performances in the last months. With one hope: to get the Olympic qualification. There, in Rio de Janeiro (BRA), they will have perhaps the opportunity to meet and share their experiences.

Within its FINA Development Programme, a number of young promising athletes aspiring to participate in the upcoming 2016 Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro have been selected to benefit from an annual FINA scholarship helping them prepare for international competitions, train in a high-level environment and hopefully achieve a "B" standard time over their cursus.

The FINA Scholarship Programme offers the opportunity to obtain financial and technical assistance for one potential elite athlete that has

- been put forward and proposed by its National Federation (NF). Under FINA's control, the NFs are solely responsible to manage the scholarship funds and provide the selected athletes with the best possible high performance environment.
- Three different programmes are available the short-term programme (3 months), the mediumterm programme (3-6 months) and the longterm programme (6-12 months). In some cases, the athletes train in their home country while in other cases, the athletes train abroad in a centre certified by FINA, depending on the facilities available within their own nation. FINA follows carefully the scholarship recipients to keep track of the progress, times and latest improvement.
- Jordan's Khader Bagalah, 17, has benefitted from this programme since 2014. The young Middle-East talent has been training since eleven years. With an impressive training routine which includes around seven water sessions and three strength sessions and various other physicals. Khader is known for his excellent endurance and impeccable technique in all four strokes.



SWIMMING FOR ALL, SWIMMING FOR LIFE

The "Swimming for All – Swimming for Life" is a special and relatively recent programme created in 2014 with the goal to teach how to swim and to promote physical activity through swimming across the globe.

The programme's main objective is to offer the possibility to individuals from all ages, different backgrounds and capacities, of taking swimming lessons.

The programme's mission is to ensure FINA 208 National Federations provide better access to an affordable, functional and safe aquatic space and the development of an accessible aquatic environment for all people interested in swimming.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO) Global report on drowning of 18th November 2014, 372'000 people die each year due to drowning. Through this programme, FINA is committed to improving these alarming statistics in close cooperation with the International Olympic Committee, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), the Intergovernmental Committee for Physical Education and Sport (CIGEPS), Governments, non-governmental organisations and FINA members.

FINA organised on 16th May 2014 in Lausanne (SUI) a meeting with representatives of the IOC, United Nations Office on Sport for Development and Peace (UNOSDP), United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), World Health Organisation (WHO), UNESCO-CIGEPS, Peace and Sport, and members of the "FINA Swimming for All, Swimming for Life" Commission, which met later in the year in Lausanne on 5th September 2014.

Some information sessions on the FINA Swimming for All – Swimming for Life project were organised

in the framework of the 16th FINA World Championships Kazan 2015 (RUS) on 23rd July 2016, the celebration of the FINA World Aquatics Gala – Soirée des Etoiles in Budapest (HUN) on 31st January 2016, the 13th FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) 2016 in Windsor (CAN) on 3rd December 2016.

The latest initiative within this programme was particularly successful: Bangkok hosted from May 15-17, 2017 the first-ever FINA International Clinic – Swimming for All, Swimming for Life. It brought together participants from 49 countries, representing the five continents. The Clinic, chaired by FINA Vice-President and IOC Member Sam Ramsamy, aimed at creating unified and uniform fundamental principles. It provided the participants with technical and practical information on the learning of swimming in different circumstances and infrastructures, to be familiar with the health and safety of participants and the organisation and development of lessons.

The aim of the Clinic was not only to spread mass teaching of swimming and life-saving techniques but also to contribute to the integration, education and inclusion of citizens in the places where it is applied.

Promoting swimming in the 21st century not only means producing high-quality events and records but also achieving the type of access for all people for the recreational, healthy and appropriate practices for a healthy lifestyle, and most importantly preventing drowning and thus saving lives.

A World Health Organization (WHO) global report on drowning of November 2014 said 372,000 people die each year due to drowning. As the guardians of aquatic sports, FINA could not face this reality without acting.

Addressing the delegates, FINA President Dr. Julio C. Maglione said: "Our federation is known for its memorable sporting events and its major stars in six disciplines across five continents and 208 federations but as the organisation responsible for aquatic sports we are also conscious of having a crucial social responsibility to all those who are not familiar with our great natural element, water."

For the success of the programme and to contribute to its universality, the Governments' collaboration and awareness of the relevance of its implementation are of outmost importance. FINA is focused on cooperating with Governments to translate the programme into tangible and sustained actions that save lives.

3. SERVING OUR 207 NATIONAL FEDERATIONS

In accordance with the Financial Statements, also published in this report, it is evident that FINA continued its policy of re-investing part of its revenue in direct assistance to the National Federations, and to the payment of prize money for our best athletes.

On the first point, FINA's support is mainly provided in the form of travel, accommodation and meals expenses assistance to the National Federations and athletes taking part at the FINA World Championships and FINA World Swimming Championships (25m). For the period 2013-2016, this support ascended to almost US\$ 17 million.

Moreover, our top-level competitions are also distributing an increasing amount of prize money to our Stars. For the same four-year period of 2013-2016, FINA has allocated over US\$ 23 million for the payment of prize money. As a comparison, for the previous four-year period (2009-2012), this value hadn't reached US\$ 13 million.





MEETINGS

The TSC has had meetings:- 6 & 7 December 2013 in Bangkok (THA), 2 December 2014 in Doha (QAT), 31 July 2015 in Kazan (RUS), 23 August 2015 in Singapore (SIN), 4 & 5 August 2016 in Rio de Janeiro (BRA), 4 December 2016 in Windsor (CAN), and finally in Budapest (HUN) in connection with the 17th FINA World Championships.

Minutes have been distributed to all Federations via the FINA Office in Lausanne (SUI).

FINA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 16th FINA World Championships held in Kazan (RUS) - Swimming from 2 - 9 August 2015 hosted in the Kazan Arena was a great success. Thanks to Secretary General Ranko Tepavcevic of the Kazan Organising Committee for excellent organisation. For the first time, both the competition pool and the warm-up pool were installed in a football arena under the same roof. Both Heats' and Finals' session were very well attended; between 8.000 - 11.000 audiences were counted. The TV production was excellent. The total number of swimmers were 1.217 (534 women, 683 men) from 185 Federations. A record number. There were 2.169 individual entries (1.004 women, 1.165 men), and 153 relays. For the first time at the World Championships Mixed Relays were on the programme. These relays were very popular. The most extraordinary situation was three bronze medals in the Women's 200m Breaststroke.

Katie Ledecky (USA) and Sun Yang (CHN) were the best swimmers of the 16th FINA World Championships in Kazan (RUS), after the completion of the eight days of competition. The US star collected five golds and three World Records, while the Chinese champion goes home with two world titles and a silver medal. The team of the United States also won the overall "Team Trophy" of the competition. USA won 23 medals (8 gold, 10 silver and 5 bronze) followed by Australia with 16 medals (7 – 3 – 6) and China with 13 medals (5 – 1 – 7). 21 Federations were represented on the medals' podium. 12 new World Records, 19 Championships Records and 12 World Junior Records were established.


FINA WORLD SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS (25M)

The 12th FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) were held at the Hamdan Aquatic Centre in Doha (QAT) from 3 - 7 December 2014. The Doha OC and the Qatar Swimming Association are to be congratulated with very well organised Championships. The 10 lane permanent pool was used. The warm-up pool had 20 lanes. An additional warm-up pool was available at the Aspire Dome. Again the number of participating Federations and swimmers were increased: 168 Federations made entries with 966 athletes (569 M - 397 W). No less than 23 World Records were established; further 24 Championships records were bettered. 6 new relay events - all 4x50m - were introduced at the Championships. USA again won the Championships Trophy scoring 849 points before Russia with 582 points and Japan with 574 points. Katinka Hosszu (HUN) and Chad Le Clos (RSA) were honoured as the best swimmers of the Doha Championships. In the medal rankings Brazil came first (7-1-2) before Hungary (6-3-2) and the Netherlands (5-1-6). 22 Federations had swimmers on the podium in Doha.

The 13th FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) were held in Windsor (CAN) in the WFCU Arena from 6 – 11 December 2016, originally an

OC Event Technical Director Amr Badawi and his team did an excellent job. TSC members and officials from the UAE Federation managed the Last Call Room very well. The performance of the swimmers was very high. A total of 47 Champi-

onships Records were recorded (Lima 42) + one equaled. Nine (9) DQ's were declared. No protests were received. The 6 Day Programme worked very well. Mixed relays were for the first time introduced at the FINA World Junior Swimming Championships. Both relays were very popular amongst the teams. The team from USA took the Championships Trophy for Girls with 517 points, followed by Australia with 374 points and Russia with 316 points. The Boys Trophy was also secured by the team from the USA with 410 points, followed by Russia with 358,5 points and Australia with 332 points. In the Combined Team Scores the winner was USA with 989 points before Australia with 770 points and Russia with 740.50 points.

ice hockey rink, like 1997 in Gothenburg (SWE). The competition pool was a temporary pool with 10 lanes. The layout with a video wall at the start end covering the width of the pool was fantastic. Results and videos were also displayed on the cube hanging over the centre of the pool. Omega and Sports Presentation was not on pool deck due to limited space along the pool deck. The warm up pool at the WFCU Arena had only 6 lanes. However, the Aquatics Center in the city was used by swimmers not in competition.

153 Federations are entered through the FINA GMS system with 864 swimmers (500 M and 364 Women). Due to visa problems many entered swimmers were not present. 2 World Records and 7 Championships Records were established; in addition 10 Continental Records were noted.

USA again won the Championships Trophy scoring 1027 points before Japan with 748 points and Russia with 674 points. Katinka Hosszu (HUN) and Chad Le Clos (RSA) were honoured as the best swimmers of the Windsor Championships. In the medal rankings, USA came first (8 – 15 – 7) before Hungary (7 – 2 – 2) and the Russian Federation (6 – 5 – 3). 22 Federations had swimmers on the podium in Windsor.

FINA WORLD JUNIOR SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 4th FINA World Junior Swimming Championships were organised from 26 – 31 August 2013 *by the UAE Swimming Federation* in Dubai (UAE). The venue was the magnificent Hamdan Bin Mohammed Bin Rashid Sports Complex constructed in 2010. The organisation of the Championships was great and the competition was conducted successfully. The Dubai Sports Chanel transmitted all sessions live. In addition the Championships could be followed live on FINA TV. A record number of 90 FINA Members Federations were present in Dubai (UAE). In Lima (PER) 2011, 58 Federations were in attendance. 712 swimmers (380 Boys – 332 Girls) were entered. The total numbers of individual entries were 2.027, the number of relay entries 172.

The Opening Ceremony was held one (1) hour before the first evening of finals. The Opening Ceremony included local entertainment. After the official speeches, FINA President Dr. Julio Maglione opened the Championships. Heats in the morning started at 10.00 hours, Semi Finals and Finals at 18.00 hours. 10 lanes were used for heats and 8 lanes for semi-finals and finals. The medals ranking ended as follows:

Among the boys, Mackenzie Horton (AUS) won four individual gold medals, getting all the titles from 200m to 1500m free. In the girl's field, the most successful swimmer was Ruta Meilutyte, from Lithuania, who also left the United Arab Emirates with four individual victories. Meilutyte, 2012 Olympic champion, and already a world winner at senior level, dominated, as expected, in the Breaststroke events, but competed with success in new distances (gold medal in the 50m Free, for example). All results and rankings available on the FINA Website.

The 5th FINA World Junior Swimming Championships were organised from 25 – 30 August 2015 by the *Singapore Swimming Association* in Singapore (SIN). The venue was the les than 2 year old OCBC Aquatic Centre. The organisation of the Championships was great and the competition was conducted successfully. The Championships could be followed live on FINA TV. 670 swimmers (379 Men and 291 Female) from 87 Federations were entered through the FINA GMS system with 2.048 individual entries and 189 relay entries.

The Opening Ceremony was held one (1) hour before the first evening of finals. The Opening Ceremony included local entertainment. After the official speech of FINA President Dr. Julio Maglione, the President of Singapore Tony Tan opened the Championships. Heats in the morning started at 10.00 hours, Semi Finals and Finals at 18.00 hours. 10 lanes were used for heats and 8 lanes for semi-finals and finals.

The competition itself ran extremely smoothly both in heats' and finals' sessions. OC competition manager Arthur Lee and his team did an excellent job. TSC members managed the Last Call Room very well.

In the women's events, Victoria Gunes (TUR) clocked better time (2:19.64) in the 200m Breaststroke than the eventual World Champion at the FINA World Championships in Kazan. She also topped the women's 50m and 100m Breaststroke on Day 2 and 3, and the 200m Individual Medley. For her outstanding performances, she was crowned the best female swimmer of the meet while among the men Michael Andrew (USA) earned this honour. He won the 50m Backstroke, was second in the 50m Freestyle and the 50m Butterfly. Still, he was crowned the man of the meet with 13 points (he won 5 medals in total), just one more than Anton Chupkov (RUS), winner of the 100m and 200m Breaststroke on the last day.

As for the individual merits, Kyle Chalmers (AUS) won the most medals, seven (3-3-1, two in individual events and five in relays), Anton Chupkov (RUS) and Victoria Gunes (TUR) captured the most titles (4 each), and the Turkish swimmer finished atop in the individual race for the FINA Trophy with 24 points, Minna Atherton was ranked second with 21. These two produced the best swims, Victoria Gunes's extraordinary 200m breast is worth 988 FINA points, while Minna Atherton's WJR in the 100m Backstroke amounts 928 FINA points, the same as Anton Chupkov's 200m Breaststroke which tops the boy's FINA points ranks.

18 Federations were represented on the medals' podium. The top teams were:

The Championship Trophy went to the USA with 973 points, ahead of Russia (755) and Australia (699).

WORLD JUNIOR RECORDS

On proposal of the TSC the FINA Bureau agreed to introduce World Junior Records in 50m pools valid from 1 April 2014. In addition World Junior Records in 25m pools were introduced from 1 January 2015.

FINA SWIMMING WORLD CUP

In this term of the TSC, Swimming World Cup events have been held in the Middle East, Europe and Asia in the following cities: Dubai (UAE), Doha (QAT), Moscow (RUS), Hong Kong (HKG), Beijing (CHN), Tokyo (JPN) and Singapore (SIN). In 2015 Chartres (FRA) was added to the circuit. Berlin (GER) came back in 2016. Since 2012 Mixed Relays in 4x50 m Freestyle and 4x50 m Medley have been part of the programme. Prize money as well as cluster prize money has been increased. Members of the TSC have acted as Technical Delegates. From the 2017 edition a new format will be introduced.

TECHNICAL CONGRESS

For the Technical Swimming Congress held in Barcelona (ESP) in July 2013 in connection with the FINA World Championships the outgoing TSC had prepared several rule proposals for a better and easier understanding of the rules. Concerning the strokes, some changes were mainly made in Breaststroke. Mixed Relays are proposed to be added to all future FINA Championships. The Congress also adopted some Federation proposals. Further GR and FR Rules were also changed. In connection with the Extraordinary Congress held in December 2014 in Doha (QAT) further rules changes were adopted. The outgoing TSC has prepared rule proposals for the Technical Swimming Congress 2017 to be held in Budapest (HUN).

SWIMMMING OFFICIALS LISTS

During the term of office, the TSC prepared the Swimming Officials List No. 18 for Referees and Starters (2015 – 2018). Also List No. 19 (2017 – 2020) has been approved by the FINA Bureau. From List No. 19 the age limit was changed to be 65 years of age by the start of the list.

SWIMMING OFFICIALS SEMINARS

The 11th FINA World Swimming Officials Seminar was held in Miami (USA) on 20 & 21 June 2014. The Seminar was very well organised and financially supported by USA Swimming. The Seminar was only open for participants on FINA Lists. 100 participants from 61 FINA Member Federations took part. FINA Vice President & TSC Bureau Liaison Dale Neuburger together with TSC Chair Carol Zaleski and TSC Honorary Secretary Søren Korbo conducted the event.

The 12th edition of the FINA World Swimming Officials Seminar has been organised in Rio de Janeiro (BRA) on the 12-13th of April, 2016, with the collaboration of the Brazilian Swimming Federation (CBDA). The event took place in Hilton Barra Rio de Janeiro, hotel located next to the Barra Olympic Park. Moreover this Seminar was organised prior to the LVI Brazilian Swimming Championships Maria Lenk Trophy - Test Event Rio 2016 (April, 15-20, 2016), an event where some of the local participants were nominated to officiate. 63 Officials from 24 Federations took part in the Seminar in Rio de Janeiro (BRA).

FINA's targeted group in the 12th edition of the FINA World Swimming Officials Seminar was the officials nominated to participate in the Rio 2016 Olympic Games. Furthermore, in order to take advantage of this great opportunity, the Local Organising Committee nominated one official from each Brazilian State to participate in the Seminar with the purpose to educate and raise the level of their main officials.

Apart from the International Technical Officials nominated to participate in the Rio 2016 Olympic Games, the reserves were also invited to participate.

XXXI OLYMPIC GAMES 2016, RIO DE JANEIRO (BRA)

The swimming events at the XXXI Olympic Games 2016 were held over 8 days from

6 - 13 August 2016. The Aquatics Centre at the Olympic Park was constructed as a temporary venue, a steel construction with no fixed walls only with a decorated textile cover. Due to the construction only 8 lanes could be used for Heats. The warm-up area covered by a big tent featured a 10 lane pool and gave excellent conditions to the athletes. A record number of 172-NOC's were present. 915 participants were listed including a Refugee Olympic Team and also including reinstated Russian swimmers. In the end, the effective participation was of 899 swimmers. Again the procedure was rather complicated. The FINA Office has done an excellent job in this difficult selection procedure. At the entry deadline there were

550 swimmers with A-Standard times 20 swimmers with B-Standard times 110 Relay-Only Swimmers – and 220 Universality places

The organisation of the swimming events was in the hands of Ricardo Prado, Aquatics Competition Manager, and Eduardo Gayotto, Swimming Competitions Manager.

A total of 8 World Records, 8 World Junior Records and 23 Olympic Records were broken.

Most winning swimmer was Michael Phelps, USA, with 6 gold medals and 1 silver medal. After Rio 2016, Michael Phelps has won a total of 28 Olympic medals which makes him the most decorated Olympian of all times. In the Women's events, Katie Ledecky, USA, and Katinka Hosszu, Hungary, were most successful with 3 Gold medals each. The Women's 100 m Freestyle brought 2 Gold Medal winners to the podium: Penelope Oleksiak, CAN, and Simone Manuel, USA. Some surprises were also noted: Pernille Blume, DEN, winning the Women's 50 m Freestyle, Dmitriy Balandin, KAZ, winning the Men's 200 m Breaststroke, and Joseph Schooling, SIN, winning the Men's 100 m Butterfly.

18 Federations won medals in Rio de Janeiro. The top 3 were: USA 33 medals (16 G - 8 S - 9 B), Australia 10 medals (3 G - 4 S - 3 B), Hungary with 7 medals (3 G - 4 S - 3 B).

According to the FINA By-Laws, three relay teams were disqualified for not using all entered Relay-Only Swimmers.

Daily reports have been posted on the FINA Website.

2ND YOUTH OLYMPIC SUMMER GAMES

395 swimmers from 142 Federations were present and a total of 29 Federations earned medals in the swimming competitions during the 2nd Youth Olympic Summer Games held in Nanjing (CHN) from 17 – 22 August 2014. On proposal of the TSC,



two new events were accepted by the IOC for this competition: 800m Freestyle, Boys, and 800m Freestyle, Girls. Nanjing proved a place of joy for the talented youth swimmers that took part in the 34 events on the competition programme at the Olympic Sports Complex. A total of 20 new world junior records were set, 16 in individual and four in relay events.

Host China topped the medals table with 17 awards (10 gold, 5 silver and 2 bronze). Only two nations, China and Russia, celebrated double Youth Olympic champions in both men's and women's events: Shen Duo and Yu Hexin, and Rozaliya Nasretdinova and Evgeny Rylov. Hungary, Lithuania and the USA had young hopefuls accomplishing the same feat among girls: Liliana Szilagyi, Ruta Meilutyte and Hannah Moore, respectively.

SWIMMING OFFICIALS SCHOOLS

After the approval of Swimming Officials Schools by the Bureau, the Schools were inaugurated in 2011. The TSC Commission has been working on a programme for the Schools. The Schools are regarded as a basic programme. Federations should build up educational programmes for each duty of the officials for the development of officiating within their Federation. Five Schools-were conducted in 2014: in Riga (LAT), Windhoek (NAM), Dar Es Salaam (TAN), Gros Islet (LCA), and finally Bangkok (THA). In 2015, six Schools were held in San Juan (PUR), Port Moresby (PNG), Singapore (SIN), Tra Vinh Provice (VIE), Kaunas (LTU) and Naibobi (KEN). In 2016 the number of Schools were increased to nine, held in San Fernando (TRI), Reykjavik (ISL), Larnaca (CYP), Durban (RSA), Fès (MAR), Ulaanbaatar (MGL), Doha (QAT), Suva (FIJ) and Brisbane (AUS). For 2017, 10 Schools have been approved.

SWIMMING OFFICIALS CLINICS

New presentations were introduced for the FINA Swimming Officials Clinics. At the same time, the FINA Bureau approved that Clinics without competitions should have duration of three days, Clinics including a competition a duration of five days. A new list of presenters was approved by the TSC. The Clinic presentations were made available in English, French, Spanish and Russian.



FINA DIVING EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMES AND DEVELOPMENT

1) 3RD FINA WORLD DIVING **COACHES CONFERENCE** 6-8/11/2014 ORLANDO (USA)

The 3rd FINA Diving Coaches World Conference was organised in an outstanding manner by the USA Federation and in total 99 coaches and judges from 47 Federations took part.

2) 4TH FINA WORLD DIVING **COACHES CONFERENCE** 12-15/10/2017, CHONGQING **MUNICIPALITY (CHN)**

Since the Olympic Games in Rio, the TDC works intensively on the preparation of the next FINA World Diving Judges and Coaches Conference to be organised by the Municipality of Chongqing, 12-15/10/2017.

A draft of the daily schedule as well as a variety of items for discussion were already presented during the FINA World Convention in Windsor (CAN) last November.

3) FINA JUDGES CERTIFICATION COURSES AND DEVELOPMENT SCHOOLS 2014 - 2017

FINA TDC worked intensively on the development and improvement of Judges quality and quantity using the following tools:

- a) FINA Certification Courses (FCC)
- b) FINA Development Schools (FDS)

4) THE IMPORTANCE **OF THE ISS**

In the previous period, the main target of the TDC was to develop an electronic database which could be easily used during the various diving events, providing appropriate feedback for the FINA Officials.

The ISS system assisted FINA TDC to track the activity of the certified judges, allocating them in a certain ranking according to their evaluations and competition performances. Through its capacity to provide video analysis after the conclusion of each event, ISS offered sufficient technical feedback and statistics to all officials. The system worked very efficiently providing all the technical feedback needed to improve the performance of the acting officials and assisting new officials to be educated during the various Judges courses

C) RULES AND REGULATIONS Rules

The TDC reviewed the existing diving rules and a final proposal was sent to FINA after the conclusion of the Olympic Games in Rio 2016. These proposals were considered and discussed by the Bureau and the final draft was prepared by FINA for the next FINA Congress in Budapest.

D) CONCLUSION

As a conclusion of this report, a special reference has to be made to all TDC members for their efficient collaboration, common commitment and essential contribution for the development and promotion of our sport worldwide.

The continued unilateral acceptance by all National Federations, coaches and players alike has resulted in a faster more attractive game with less violence.

The FINA TWPC met on five (5) occasions throughout the period under review, namely:

The emergence of Serbia in the Men's Competition as a "powerhouse" both in the FINA Men's World League, FINA Men's World Cup and concluding with success at the Olympic Games Rio de Janeiro 2016 highlighted what was an unprecedented period of dominance for a men's team.

The success of the United States of America in the Women's Competition in Rio de Janeiro 2016 was richly deserved having unquestionably been the most successful team in Women's Water Polo over the quadrennium; the universality of the sport and evenness of the women's competition was once again reflected where teams from four (4) continents were in the top eight (8) teams.

Hopefully with the FINA support, the gender difference that currently exists between the number of teams will be addressed at the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020 thus enabling the same qualification process for both men's and women's teams.


The Olympic Games Rio de Janeiro 2016 whilst presenting unique logistical difficulties in that the sport for the first-time shared facilities with other aquatic disciplines still showcased the very best elements of our sport; regardless of the game all the public tribunes were near full and the reports and feedback from television were extremely positive.

There is now a minimum of six (6) world water polo events conducted annually which highlights and supports the increased level of activity in the sport across all the continents.

The FINA World Water Polo Conference held Cancun February 2014 brought together a number of experts from other team sports and subjects addressed included:

- Insights from the big leagues
- Insights from newly popular team sports
- A view from the sponsor's perspective
- Views and insights from great Water Polo players
- A view from the media perspective
- A view from the Water Polo leaders

The FINA TWPC would like to express its sincere appreciation to FINA for the organisation of this first FINA World Water Polo Conference.





The FINA World Water Polo Conference clearly provided the catalyst for the introduction and trialling of the Test Rules at particular designated events in 2015 and 2016 including slight variations to same during 2016.

The FINA Water Polo Technical Congress to be held Budapest 2017 will be the final arbiter as to elements of the Test Rules that are incorporated into the Rules of Water Polo for the ensuing quadrennium.

The only disappointment was that apart from the reduction in the field of play none of the other Test Rules were not trialled at senior level.

The decision by the FINA Bureau at its meeting in Madrid (ESP) September 2006 to support the proposal of the FINA TWPC for the introduction of the FINA Men's Development Trophy Tournament for teams from countries that had not previously participated in FINA Events was a further initiative to support very practically the sport globally; the very successful conduct of the 5rd FINA Men's Development Trophy Tournament was held Kuwait City (KUW) in May 2013 with 5th FINA Men's Development Trophy Tournament being also successfully hosted by the I R Iran Amateur Swimming Association in Tehran in April 2015. The FINA TWPC would like to acknowledge the wonderful support of the Kuwait Swimming Association of this event having hosted same on three occasions.

The FINA Men's & Women's World League as already mentioned has witnessed increased activity in Asia and Oceania and continues to provide a very important development tool for the sport globally; it would be remiss not to acknowledge the strides that Asia has continued to take in this period in the development of the sport but limited activity in the Americas is of concern.

The revised competition schedule for the European edition both the FINA Men's and Women's Water Polo World Leagues has seen the teams play on a home and away basis over a six month period and from reports this format has been very well received with both spectators and television.

Following a meeting held Frankfurt in September 2013 of the other continents the emergence of the FINA World League Intercontinental Water Polo Tournament was born, where teams from Africa, Americas, Asia and Oceania play in either a "round Non-European sides could make some splash as well (pictured: a scene from a Kazan match between Canada and Brazil) robin" or "group format" to determine the teams that qualify for the Super Final. Initially these Intercontinental Water Polo Tournaments proved to be quite successful but the "tyranny of costs" has

once again impacted on these events.

The continued very successful conduct of the Super Final of the FINA Women's Water Polo World League in Beijing (CHN) June 2013, Kunshan (CHN) June 2014 and Shanghai (CHN) June 2015 and June 2016 by the China Swimming Association, the Super Final of the FINA Men's Water Polo World League held Bergamo (ITA) June 2015 by the Italian Swimming Federation and subsequently in Huizhou (CHN) June 2016 by the China Swimming Association exemplify what can be achieved and how the sport can be both presented and promoted.

The FINA TWPC would like to acknowledge the wonderful support of the China Swimming Association in the hosting of FINA Water Polo Events since 2006; the support and co-operation received has been nothing short of outstanding and to this end the FINA TWPC proposed that the China Swimming Association be the recipient of the FINA Prize for 2016 and it is pleasing to report that this was supported and approved by the FINA Bureau at its meeting held Windsor (CAN) December 2016.

The very successful staging of the FINA Youth Men's Water Polo World Championships in Podgorica (MNE) August 2016 was a further event very well presented and promoted; this event was very well attended with live television coverage and the Montenegro Swimming Federation is to be congratulated on its staging of this event; this coupled with the very successful conduct of the FINA Youth Women's Water Polo World Championships in Auckland (NZL) December 2016 strongly indicates the important place that these Youth World Championships have on the Calendar for Water Polo.



The production and publication of a completely revised FINA Water Polo Guide in this period has proved to be a valuable document for all those involved in the promotion and worldwide development of the sport of water polo. The FINA TWPC would like to acknowledge the support and assistance of the FINA Office in the production of this resource and in particular the help of Ms Mirjam Heller, FINA Water Polo Coordinator.

Finally, the FINA TWPC has "teamed" with the FINA Sports Medicine Committee to propose the Use of Video Review in Water Polo.

The FINA TWPC has proposed that GR 9.2 be amended to read, namely:

- (a) if the rules and regulations for the conduct of the competition are not observed, provided that, in water polo events where special circumstances exist a video record may be used.
- (b) if other conditions endanger the competitions and/or competitors, or
- (c) against decisions of the referee; however, no protest shall be allowed against decisions of fact, provided that, in water polo events where

special circumstances exist a video record may be used.

Please note that the FINA TWPC is mindful of the data collected by the FINA Sports Medicine Committee particularly related to the sport of Water Polo and by this amendment it provides the FINA TWPC the opportunity to review possible unfair actions by players and sanction same accordingly thus creating a "fair play sport for all".

It is envisaged that initially such review process would be limited to Olympic Games and FINA World Championships where the technology and recording of games is readily available. As this represents a change to the General Rules, the proposal will need to be considered by the FINA General Congress to be held Budapest July 2017.

Albeit brief, the FINA TWPC Chairman Gianni Lonzi, Vice Chairman FINA TWPC Khosrow Amini and myself have endeavoured to outline the activities of the FINA TWPC during the review period and as can be seen it has been a growth period for our discipline in meetings, events and activities all demonstrating the universality of the sport; this activity would not have been possible without the support of FINA for which we are indeed grateful.

INNOVATIONS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN THE PERIOD 2013 -2017

 The updated Judges and Coaches Synchronised Swimming Manual was prepared in November 2013 and distributed to federations along with videos of the new Figures and Elements;

 Held a major Worldwide Seminar for Coaches and Judges in St. Petersburg, Russia in October 2013;

Inclusion of the Mixed Duet at the 2015 and 2017 World Championships, the World Trophy in 2015 and 2016 and the new World Series. Specific elements for Mixed Duet were created and distributed in December 2016;

• Organisation of the FINA Synchronised Swimming World Series beginning in March 2017. There are seven events on the 2017 programme, hosted by the following Member federations: France, China, Japan, Canada, Spain, the USA and Uzbek-



istan. In order to be eligible for prize money, federations must participate in at least four competitions. All events are considered: Solo (technical and free), Duet (technical and free), Mixed Duet (Technical and Free), Team (Technical and Free), Free Combination and Highlights. The federations may decide which events they will participate in;

FINA Judges schools were successfully held throughout the quadrennium and the number of $\frac{Q}{G}$ judges has reached 351 as of March 2017. Judges schools were held on every continent. FINA Judges are now categorised into two lists - A and G;

An excellent Evaluators seminar was held in Kazan in 2015. All twenty FINA evaluators were in attendance. Evaluators continue to work diligently at many FINA and continental championships. At competitions where judges are selected by the TSSC (Olympic Games, Olympic Qualifying Meet and World Championships) any needed evaluation is performed by the referees and Commission.

Japanese are coming up, once again: Yukiko Inui and Risoko Mitsui

The new FINA Development programme's strategy for developing countries was accepted by the FINA Bureau and the implementation of

this exciting opportunity is expected in late 2017. The Public Relations Committee has distributed key messages to the Synchro and to the larger Aquatics community. Messages related to the Mixed Duet, the FINA Synchronised Swimming World Series, and the anticipated change of name to Artistic Swimming are among these messages.

The Coaches Committee held a productive educational session for coaches on the occasion of the 2015 World Championships in Kazan.

The Degree of Difficulty Working Group met in Virginia, USA in January, 2015 and continued their important work of providing the appropriate degrees of difficulty for all figures and elements.

OW AT THE OLYMPIC GAMES

After the big success of London 2012 (Hyde Park) we had another fantastic competition in Rio

2016 (Copacabana beach), finally for the first time in open sea. We had a lot of spectators following the two 10km events (Male and Female) with 25 and 26 (unique occasion) competitors per gender. The Netherlands won both gold medals with Ferry Weertman and Sharon van Rouwendaal.

The TOWSC will work to increase the participants' number at the next Olympics in Tokyo and maybe add a new OW event in the Olympic programme.

For the qualification to these Olympics, has been used the previous OW World Championships results (Kazan 2015) plus a qualifying event (Setubal 2016), where there were 48 women and 61 men.

OW WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

After the 2011 FINA Bureau decision, these Championships have been organised every two years (Barcelona 2013 – Kazan 2015) moving the OW Junior World Championships in even years (Balatonfured 2014 – Hoorn 2016).

After 2014, the Junior age groups changed from 2 to 3 categories for both genders:

- 14 15 years old
- 16 17 years old
- 18 19 years old

with a different programme:

14 - 15 years old - 5 km boys and girls

- 16 17 years old 7.5 km boys and girls
- 18 19 years old 10 km boys and girls

and Team Event (3 swimmers with two genders) changed in Team Relay (2 boys and 2 girls), 1,250 km per swimmer with two categories (14/15/16 and U19).

FINA MARATHON WORLD CUP AND GP SERIES

We had two different Calendars for the two annual series, starting in February and finishing in October. Unfortunately the number of these events decreased namely due to the economic crisis all around the world.

TOWSC members have tried to convince new Promoters around the world to be part of our Calendar, by organising specific Promoters Meetings.

FINA maintained the presence of 3 Delegates in each event (Technical, Safety and Medical), just to support and supervise the respective OC.

At the same time FINA invited each Marathon OC to organise a Mass Event in connection with the FINA elite race.

Looking at the two Calendars we have this continental distribution:

AMERICA5 Events (2 Argentina, 3 Canada)ASIA3 Events (China, Hong Kong, UAE)EUROPE3 Events (Portugal, Republic of
Macedonia, Italy)

CONTINENTAL ACTIVITIES

In each Continent, we had a big activity in our discipline with local, regional and national events. We had Continental Championships except in Africa, but some countries in this part of the world are looking for future opportunities to stage a continental showcase.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

With the ultimate goal of growing this discipline, the main decisions of the TOWSC during this period were:

The final report presented by a specific Medical Committee on low water temperature established the limit of 16° for our competitions, but at the same time it has been decided the use of wetsuits starting from January 1, 2017 following the water temperature (mandatory 16°- 17.9°, optional 18° – 19.9°, excluded from 20°).

The new age groups for Juniors Championships (14/15, 16/17, 18/19) for both genders.

The change of Team Event in Team Relay (2 men, 2 women) with 1,250 km for each swimmer (total 5 km) making this event more spectacular.

We enhanced the experience of the local announcer at Olympic Games and World Championships, so that he/she is able to give more explanations and information about our discipline to the public during the competitions.

OWS PROMOTION

Our important events (OW Olympic Games and World Championships) were essential for the promotion of our discipline. In fact, after London 2012 we had two wonderful competitions in Barcelona (2013) and Kazan (2015). Especially in this last event, the location and the preparation was fantastic giving an amazing image of OW discipline. In 2016, we had the Rio OG event in front of one of the most beautiful beaches (Copacabana) where international TV broadcasted all around the world our events. The Junior Championships (Balatonfured 2014 – Hoorn 2016) were also a huge success, showing that NFs invest in OW from young age groups.

OW NEWS

Each Continent has its magazines and newspapers that promote and inform about our discipline. There are also a lot of private and public websites that follow our competitions with pictures and videos. FINA too, with its website and magazine, is actively supporting us.

CLINICS AND FINA OFFICIALS SCHOOL

FINA organised every year several clinics all around the world to promote our discipline.

At the same time, FINA Official Schools continue to prepare more international Officials in OW. It was decided that these Officials, if approved in final exams, could be eligible for our FINA Official lists. In this way we could have good elements ready to officiate in a World Championship or maybe Olympic Games. For these Schools, lecturers are chosen among TOWSC members.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT

With the introduction of wetsuits, we hope to include more events, especially from the north hemisphere. We will also try to improve the number of Olympic competitors, so that it can better reflect the development and value of our discipline. The option to create a new Relay is to make it more attractive, with the possibility to be included in the OG.

Moreover we should try to improve our FINA Calendars and include new organisers.

The TV support is also essential to promote OW not only during the OG but the remaining four years. We expect more "pool" swimmers to switch to OW making more famous and visible this discipline.

OFFICIALS

A set of experienced High Diving Judges (active in the Red Bull Series) were used for all FINA High Diving Events since 2013. The THDC proposed the introduction of a High Diving Judges Certification Course to increase the number of certified officials and to provide a FINA recognised standard in line with other aquatics disciplines. This was approved initially at the meeting in Kazan 2015 and was reviewed and resubmitted at the Bureau meeting in Windsor 2016

CLINICS

1st FINA High Diving Judges Certification Course will be held during the training days at the FINA World Championships in Budapest - 28th-29th July 2017. Twelve judges will be selected to attend the clinic ensuring continental representation across the developing discipline.

The THDC have also considered the development of a coach's education programme which we hope will be continued by the newly appointed THDC for 2017-2021

Commission Site Visit for detailed final preparation of the Kazan FINA World Masters Championships – July 25-26, 2015

3rd FINA Aquatics Convention – Doha, Qatar
 November 29-December-01, 2014.

Each of the Committee meetings revolved around the organisation and management of the FINA World Masters Championships in Montreal, Canada 2014; Kazan, Russia, 2015; and Budapest, Hungary to be held 7-20, August 2017. Members of the committee worked long hours to assist the organising committee with the efficient running of two highly successful events. With the successful combining of the FINA World Championships and FINA World Masters Championships there will be three Championships in the 2013-2017 term. It was particularly pleasing for the Commission to be in attendance once again at the FINA Convention in Doha, Qatar. The convention is an ideal opportunity for Masters to network with the Federations and promote the Masters movement. In Doha, Qatar the Chairman participated in a workshop and presented the topic, "*New Horizons – Innovation to Expand and Develop the Masters Movement Worldwide*". The Chairman's presentation highlighted in slide and video the health and wellness benefits of Masters and promoted the future of the FINA World Masters Championships combining with the FINA World Championships.

Highlights

At the first meeting the Chairman presented the committee with an outline of the objectives to be achieved over the term of the committee. These included;

• To continue the reorganisation and improvement of the Masters rules to be presented to the Congress in Budapest in 2017.

•To further revise the Masters By-laws to ensure best practices for running the FINA World Masters Championships.

• To continue to upgrade and improve the Guides for Conducting Masters Events, Entry Booklet Template, Water Polo Draw, WP Schedule Template and OWS Safety Manual.

• Provide support and to strengthen relationships with Continental Organisations.

 Provide support and guidance to the Organising Committee on the running of the FINA Masters World Championships.

• To contribute information about Masters to the FINA office for publication in FINA Aquatics World.

 To participate in the FINA Aquatics Conventions.

XV FINA WORLD MASTERS CHAMPIONSHIPS, MONTREAL, CANADA, 27 JULY - 10TH AUGUST, 2014

The successful XV edition of the FINA World Masters Championships was held in Montreal, Canada from July 27-August 10, 2014. The Championships attracted 7853 competitors, the second highest since the start of the FINA World Masters Championships in Japan in 1986. There were 5893 Swimmers for a total of 21,653 individual entries. The 230 Divers showed 699 starts. There were a total of

487 Synchronised Swimmers with 796 starts and 70 Water Polo Teams with a total of 949 players. The OWS started with 1357 swimmers. Ninety-Seven (97) Federations were represented and 31 World Records were set along with 145 Championship Records. CEO Pierre Cloutier and his Committee did a good job hosting these Championships.

XVI FINA WORLD MASTERS CHAMPIONSHIPS, KAZAN, RUSSIA, 5-16 AUGUST 2015

The XVI edition of the FINA World Masters Championships was held in Kazan. Russia from August 05 -16th, 2015. This was the first edition of the FINA World Masters Championships held immediately following the FINA World Championships in the same venues as experienced by the elite competitors. This was a most successful venture and resulted in many Masters Competitors taking advantage of viewing elite events and provided an excellent feeling of inclusion in FINA's largest event. There were many positives including special awards ceremonies, excellent volunteers and officials, outstanding opening and closing ceremonies and the very best in organisation for the athletes. This was the first occasion also to use the FINA GMS for registration and accreditation and this worked exceptionally well. The numbers of participants was lower than expected but attributed to the fact that two Championships were held only one year between them and travel distance may have been difficult for some participants. There were a total of 2640 competitors including 2002 swimmers with 6152 starts. Water Polo attracted 30 teams with 429 players. Synchro was 35 Swimmers with 26 starts. Diving was 72 divers with 177 starts. Open Water Swimming was 366 Swimmers. Sixty-Eight (68) Federations were represented, 31 World Records set along with 81 Championship Records. Executive Directorate for Sports Projects Azat Kadyrov along with Secretary General of the Executive Directorate for Sports Projects, Ranko Tepavcevic did an excellent job in managing the event in outstanding facilities.

FINA Website

In close liaison with Walt Reid the FINA Masters Recorder FINA continues to manage up-to-date information on World Records and Top Ten results.

Rules

The Masters Committee continues to improve on the presentation of Rules and By-laws. The inclusion of the items pertaining to the running of the FINA Masters World Championships in By-laws rather than Rules allows for more effective management of the Championships and further allows for adjustments for venues and items specific to the particular Championship at hand. This format works verv well.

Development of Masters Swimming Worldwide

The committee has been actively encouraging further development of Masters Swimming particularly in the Continental regions. Continental Masters Championships are now been held in most of the Continental areas. There have been significant increases in the numbers attending the Continental Masters Championships particularly in UANA and LEN

Conclusion

The committee has worked very hard over the last four years on a range of initiatives aimed at improving the way the FINA Masters World Championships are conducted. Every member of the committee was assigned to one task or another and it is pleasing to report that the Commission received very good support from all the members. Persons are assigned to each discipline with one being responsible for a written report at the end. These reports have been useful in making improvements. A considerable amount of time has been spent on developing better information for Master's organisations. In this regard, the work carried out by Mr Walt Reid the FINA Masters Recorder deserves special mention.

Research Programmes

Injury and Illness research study, Barcelona 2013, Kazan 2015, Budapest 2017

Ongoing collection of athlete injury and illness data provide insight into the needs of all aquatic athletes at FINA World Championships. The retrospective athlete survey provides information on the recent illness and injuries that the athletes have coming into the Championships. This information helps to direct the FINA Sports Medicine Committee in the development of interventions to improve the athletes' health as well as their performances. Surprisingly, the percentage of the athletes coming to the Championships injured is, as high as 37%. Each aquatic discipline shows different injury patterns, as expected, but the high percentage of over-use injury was unexpected. Plans and protocols to monitor athlete health status during the training period outside of the Championships were developed in a consensus meeting of expert scientists from around the world held in Doha Qatar in December 2014. The outcome of this consensus meeting was also published in the British Journal of Sport Medicine.

Thermal Stress - Cold Water

Research with the cooperative efforts of FINA, the IOC, ITU was conducted at the Extreme Environments Laboratory in the Department of Sport and Exercise Science at the University of Portsmouth, UK – Prof. Mike Tipton, Professor of Human and Applied Physiology and Dr Jane Seychell. (Coordinating SMC members: Dr. Boyd with assistance from Dr. Miller)

Multiple lectures internationally were given by members of the FINA SMC at each of the World Championships to International Team Physicians as well as at all World Sports Medicine Congresses + within their continental federations. The FINA SMC Web pages, Newsletter, Medical Corner of the Magazine will continue to be used to educate aquatic athletes and coaches globally.

Swimmers Heart Study

The initial FINA Swimmer's Heart Project was conducted during the 2014 FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) in Doha, Qatar. This study was a cooperative effort with Aspetar and FINA to assess the feasibility of in-competition cardiovascular screening. The objective was to guide the implementation of future screening and to facilitate the understanding of cardiac adaptation in swimmers. The follow-up study was conducted with the partnership of Aspetar and the University of Guelph in Windsor, Canada, at the 2016 FINA World Swimming Championships (25m). Conclusions and direction of future cardiac surveys are under development for future FINA events to include the remaining aquatic disciplines. The cooperative efforts of FINA with Aspetar make this ongoing study possible. Publications include:

FINA SPORTS MEDICINE CONGRESSES

The 18th FINA World Sports Medicine Congress, Windsor, Canada 2016

This edition was the first integration of the FINA World Sports Medicine Congress with the FINA World Aquatics Convention and the FINA Swimming Coaches Golden Clinic. This Congress was also linked to the 13th FINA World Swimming Championships (25m). The 2016 Convention had over 400 organisations participate. There were over 1000 convention delegates from around the world. The coordination of the FINA Sports Medicine Congress with the other aspects of the aquatic events gives an opportunity to collectively share information and cooperate in future ventures. There was a common track during the Convention between Coaches and Sports Medicine facilitating this joint effort.

Dr. Alan Vernec, WADA Medical Director, delivered The Bleasdale Memorial Lecture. His lecture was entitled *Murky Waters in Rio* discussing the recent Rio Olympic Games with the challenges of reported systematic and state directed doping in sport surrounding international competition.

The Cameron Award Winner for 2016 was Dr. Pattinson whose topic was *Sources of Self-Efficacy in a Competitive Diving Sample*. The Cameron award is presented at the FINA World Sports Medicine Congress for original high quality research in aquatics.

FINA Swimming for Life – Swimming for All

The FINA SMC is represented on the organisation of the important health promotion project "FINA Swimming for Life – Swimming for All". As a member of the working group, Dr. Mountjoy along with FINA Vice-President Tamas Gyarfas, organised the FINA World Aquatics Day, and lectured at the FINA Swimming for Life – Swimming for All Clinic held in Bangkok, Thailand in 2017.

FINA Quality Improvement Project: FINA Event Medical Services

An initiative to improve the quality of medical care at FINA events to protect athlete health, the FINA SMC collaborated with Aspetar to document and critique the FINA medical services. The committee of 16 athletes is made up of a few reelected members some of whom have served since 2001 and a majority newly elected members. This representation ensured balance be maintained in terms of focus and long terms goals while also adding fresh perspective to the role of the AC.

In 2014 an immediate recommendation was submitted that a minimum of 2 members be appointed to the AC for each traditional discipline as well as 1 High Diving representative to increase the exchange of ideas within the AC and ensure athlete representation at the various Technical Committee meetings; an AC priority. The Bureau duly appointed Virginie Dedieu (SS), FRA, however did not appointed a female water polo player, nor a high diver. The Bureau appointed swimmer Malick Fall (SEN), to replace Jason Dunford (Kenya), and another male water polo player, Tamas Molnar (HUN). While we appreciate the additional appointments, we recommend that future AC's include a female water polo representative to speak to the issues pertaining to ladies. I believe our AC representation is thus still lacking a balanced perspective. Lastly, our originally appointed Chair, Minxia Wu was replaced by Jihong Zhou just prior to Doha 2014.

Most members have diligently attended to their duties and have been present at all meetings. In general the AC view is that progress has been made in terms of Athlete representation on the various technical committees and that the Bureau sentiment and support toward the AC has continued to improve vastly and we thank them for that.

This commission has enjoyed several key successes, namely the recommendation and subsequent Bureau decision that starting from Barcelona 2013, the AC Chairman has a seat on the Bureau so as to ensure the full and accurate representation of the athletes interests.

In general terms, the AC devoted much of its discussions to problems surrounding poor athlete representation at certain official FINA events and brainstorming ideas around incentivising participation, adding new formats and events so as to stimulate media interest and create greater brand awareness and sponsorship ROI.

Consideration was given to issues pertaining to doping as well as the fight against doping with special emphasis on the current legal approach and resultant inconsistencies with regards to sanctioning. The request of the AC was that a framework be developed to ensure equality and a more fair approach through standardisation with regards to legal representation and processes to ensure that all Athletes be afforded the same level of representation and protection and that all sanctioning be standardised. The AC welcomed FINA acceptance of the WADA requirements pertaining to out of competition testing and the subsequent consequences of missing such tests.

Issues pertaining to Athletes safety were of ongoing concern to the commission, especially with regards to Open Water Swimming and the Rio Olympics. In addition, there was much deliberation over concerns regarding the time schedule of the swimming in Rio. The AC recommended that measures be taken within the village to ensure as little disturbance as possible for the swimmers. To my knowledge such suggestions were heeded and the swimmers coped well with the Rio situation.

Regarding athlete health issues, this committee has held lengthy discussions dealing specifically with the mental health aspects and the post retirement struggles of our athletes. The AC discussions lead to the conclusion that more education around such issues is needed and that retired athletes who have successfully transitioned can mentor and help prepare others for evential retirement.

The AC realises that continued growth in involvement, influence and general exposure to athletes at events and otherwise must be sought and applied as the role of the committee continues to broaden. AC representation on all levels as well as the increased education of athletes as to what the AC does, was and must continue to be aggressively pursued.

Lastly, AC members were appointed to represent FINA and the athlete voice at the FINA Illness and Injury Consensus meeting 2014, both the bi-annual IOC Athletes Forum and most recently the WADA annual 2017 symposium. Particiption at these events have encouraged interaction with those protecting athlete health as well as AC's of various Federations and lends itself to learning, growth and co-operation between Health and Anti-doping specialists as well as IOC affiliated Federation AC's to better represent the athletes on a global scale.

On behalf of the Athletes Committee of 2013-2017, I wish to thank FINA for the priviledge of allowing us to be the voice of the Athlete and for the opportunity to contribute to the continued development and growth of our sport.

After the designation in Barcelona of the new members for the period 2013-2017, the FINA Coaches Committee had annual meetings during all the main FINA events: Doha 2014, Kazan 2015, Windsor 2016 and is scheduled for July 2017 in Budapest.

Also one special meeting was organised by the FINA Office in Lausanne in January 2014.

During these years, the main activities of our Committee were focused especially in two main topics:

1 - Strategies for increasing participation in FINA World Cups

A summary of the discussions on new strategies for increasing the participation in FINA World Cups include:

1) Adaptation of the Calendar in order to change the date of the Clusters in different years in accordance to the locations of the FINA Long and Short Course World Championships. Also the dates for the clusters in different years were analysed to achieve the required balance between training and competition needs;

2) A new funding model to help increasing the number of swimmers and coaches, including higher prize money.

2 - The growing of the FINA Development Programme in all disciplines

1) The Coaches Committee endorses the strategy of the FINA Development Programme in all disciplines;

2) It was recommended that the appointment of lecturers for FINA Clinics needs to take into consideration the profile and skills of the proposed lecturers for each of the three levels and of course the current situation of the discipline in the country that hosts the Clinic;

3) Our help in the organisation of the FINA Coaches Golden Clinic with proposal of topics and lecturers for this outstanding event that brings top knowledge for coaches from all over the world.

Other items:

- Also our Committee made suggestions for a continuous improvement of the quality in FINA competitions, by improving swimmers and coaches' comfort in the pool;

- In Windsor, the Coaches Committee received a complete information based on the procedures and statistics of FINA's fight against doping;

- Initiatives from some countries concerning experimental Water Polo rules were discussed and it was suggested that those countries provide feedback on their experience;

- The Open Water Calendar for future Olympic Games was discussed in order to facilitate pool swimmers to participate in both events;

- Moreover, it was proposed in Kazan that Coaches Committee members should be present in all other Committee Meetings in order to provide technical support.

After these four years, we want to express our gratitude to the Executive Director Cornel Marculescu and to the FINA Office, for their continuous and great work in the organisation of our meetings. We extend our appreciation to FINA President Dr. Julio C. Maglione and to the FINA Bureau for their consideration to our proposals.

Under the leadership of its Chairman Camillo Cametti, and with the active support of its Bureau Liaison Tamas Gyarfas and FINA Executive Director Cornel Marculescu, the FINA Media Committee is pleased to note the great evolution of Aquatic sports in the period 2013-2017. Unforgettable events and outstanding stars have emerged during these years, and the work of promotion and communication around these feats has become increasingly important. Formed by experienced journalists and devoted media professionals, the Committee has played a significant role on those matters, by both ensuring that the working conditions at FINA competitions are optimal, and by actively helping in the coverage of these events.

PREPARATION AND COVERAGE OF FINA EVENTS

Before the staging of FINA's major two rendezvous – FINA World Championships and FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) -, inspection visits by the Media Committee Chairman, Head of Communications Department and FINA Photographer are normally done 2/3 months before the start of the competition and are deemed very important for both FINA and the respective Organising Committee. That was the case for Doha 2014, Kazan 2015, Windsor 2016 and Budapest 2017. Most of the recommendations made by the FINA representatives during these visits are then respected by the OCs in charge of the event, with the obvious benefits that those improvements bring to the running of the Media Operations during the competition itself.

At the FINA World Championships, the Media Committee members are asked to help the Communications Department team with the extensive coverage of the competition. For the last editions of FINA's showcase, we have put in place a dedicated homepage at www.fina.org, where fans worldwide can quickly find the main info related with the competition: results, schedule, extended start lists, photos, videos, athletes' bios, news, quotes and daily wrapups. For speeding-up processes and in order to have the information guicker on the FINA website, some of the Media Committee members have direct access to our webpage, posting their stories as soon as they are ready. For the aquatic disciplines with a heavier schedule (Swimming and Diving for example), the coverage of the competition and the production of quotes is done by two different persons.

The presence of the FINA Photographer Giorgio Scala and his team at those Championships and other FINA events is worth of note: he is not only managing all photos issues during the competition, but his role is essential in providing a good and fast archive of images to the FINA Communications team.

A dedicated plan is also established concerning the FINA social media channels, whose feed is normally included in the website homepage.

Proceeding with a policy initiated some years ago, the coverage of the annual FINA events - Swimming World Cup, Diving World Series, 10km Marathon Swimming World Cup, Water Polo World Leagues (Intercontinental tournaments and Super Finals), High Diving World Cup and Synchro World Trophy/Series - is done on a threefold basis: by appointment of Media Committee members, Communications Department team, or local correspondents in the respective countries/region. The latter solution has been discussed in several meetings of the Committee, with some members pointing out that the quality of coverage is sometimes not harmonious. The FINA Communications Department is working hard to solve this problem, and the situation has clearly improved in recent years.

FINA DIGITAL WORLD

Moreover, many improvements have been made in FINA's digital assets. The FINA website has been entirely revamped and a new, more up to date and user friendly version, was launched in November 2015. Working with the Swiss-based agency Penceo, the navigability of the website is now focused on events (a dedicated section is devoted to each one of the major FINA rendezvous) and on each of the aquatic disciplines.

The evolution on <u>www.fina.org</u> led also to the establishment of a solid athletes' bio section (provided by Gracenote, formerly known as Infostrada) and to the development of a results/rankings database, in partnership with FINA Partner Omega Timing. In all competitions ran by Omega, results are now available almost live on the FINA website, thus allowing a better information to all fans worldwide.

In 2016, an agreement was made with US company Omnigon for the development of a mobile app, a project that has been administered by the FINA team in charge of the General Management System (GMS). This mobile app was launched in three phases: prior to the 2016 FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) in Windsor (CAN), only information related to Swimming was available. Then, in March 2017, prior to the start of the FINA/NVC Diving World Series, the Diving section of the app was unveiled, and finally, in the end of April 2017, all the remaining FINA disciplines were available in this app. Designed for iOS and Android devices, this app contains three main information sections: news, results and athletes' bio'.

The FINA Youtube channel has also been dramatically improved, with a much clearer presentation, organisation of videos and production of original content.

In March 2017, FINA has established a five-year contract with Deltatre for the development of an OTT platform, plus the implementation of a strategy for FINA's social media channels. The OTT (Over-the-Top) platform is basically an enhanced online TV streaming player, which will enable the users (who will be invited to subscribe to this service) to watch FINA competitions on a live basis or on an on-demand possibility. The production of original content - interviews to the athletes, behind the scenes, features, profiles - is also part of the agreement. Besides providing the technical platform to develop the player, Deltatre will also play an essential role concerning the promotion, marketing and communication around the newest FINA OTT platform.

Concerning social media, the new OTT product was considered a priority in terms of FINA exposure on the various platforms – Facebook, Twitter... -, but Deltatre will play an enlarged role in allocating additional resources to the day-to-day operations of FINA's social channels.

FINA TV CREW

Starting in 2013, FINA has established its own TV Crew producing a dedicated coverage at the highlighted FINA Events (World Championships, World Swimming Championships, 25m). While at the beginning their work was mostly dedicated to recording flash interviews with the champions and medallists - those clips were posted in all digital platforms -, the coming years saw the production of more specialised contents, including one of the most watched clip which featured a motion recorded by a go-pro camera fixed to the wrist of high diving world champion Gary Hunt who performed a dive at a training session. More backstage features and exclusive in-depth interviews were prepared at the various events, thanks to the dedicated work of the crew which consists of two reporters and two cameramen who are also doing the editing (the members of the crew are from the professional TV team of Bureau Liaison Tamas Gyarfas).

FINA MAGAZINE

Together with Tamas Gyarfas, editor-in-chief and Bureau Liaison, and his production team in Budapest (HUN), the FINA World Aquatics magazine remains a highly-valued publication among the Aquatics community. Media Committee members and the Head of Communications Department Pedro Adrega (the other editor-in-chief of the magazine) have been very active in providing articles and interesting features for this publication, which is now distributed on an electronic format and printed in paper (2'000 copies, which are basically posted to the FINA and IOC family).

IMPROVING COMMUNICATION

Starting in April 2015, FINA has established an agreement with UK-based company JTA, specialised in communications, PR and crisis management. Given the limited resources in house and taking into account the increasing and challenging needs in terms of proactive and reactive communication, FINA chose JTA, a firm with a large experience and knowledge of the Olympic and sport business environment. Since then, the contact between JTA and FINA's Communication Department has been constant and includes several important aspects: 1. Media monitoring, with the focus being the sports business/political publications (example: Around the Rings, Inside the Games, Sportcal...); 2. Proactive communication, aimed at promoting FINA's important action in the field of doping, transparency or good governance; 3. Reactive communication, in response to adverse media reports on FINA; 4. Crisis management information, in the form of workshops or dedicated documents concerning a specific event or situation.

The advisory role of JTA in all these areas has been highly considered by FINA and the presence of JTA representatives at major FINA events is also an added-value from a communications point of view.

FINA GALA AND CONVENTION

Since 2014, the election of the Best Athletes of the Year – previously ran by the FINA World Aquatics magazine, through a vote system and then display of the results in the pages of the publication – was significantly improved. In fact, since then, FINA organises an annual Gala to reward its best competitors of the year. The first edition happened in Doha (QAT), with the occasion of the FINA World Swimming Championships (25m); the second Gala was held in Budapest (HUN) in the end of January 2016 and the third one was staged in Windsor (CAN) in December 2016. From 2016, FINA made a 10-year agreement with Chinese company Alisport, who will be the official title sponsor of the event.

Besides the election of the Best Athletes, this Gala has also introduced a novelty requiring the co-operation of the Media Committee and Communications Department: the designation of the annual FINA Media Award. This prize is aimed at rewarding eminent and influential journalists/media outlets having covered FINA events in the last years. The first three awardees of this prize were respectively Alan Abrahamson (USA, 2014), Stefano Arcobelli (ITA, 2015) and Clémentine Blondet (FRA, 2016).

The presence of Media Committee members at the bi-annual FINA Aquatics Convention is also considered of paramount importance, as many of the future trends in Sport (and in Aquatics) are discussed during this occasion. The joint organisation of this event prior to the FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) in even years has raised the participation of delegates and has also ensured a higher visibility for sponsors and partners in the Aquatics community. Moreover, the staging of specific panels devoted to communication, promotion and awareness of our Sport is essential for National Federations to understand the role of media in the development of their activities.

MEDIA GUIDE

Another important topic on this four-year period was the update of the FINA Media Guide, a fundamental tool for the organisers of the FINA events, as it contains all the requirements for an optimal set-up of a Media Operations Plan. The two main areas needing adaptation were related to the technological evolution with the Wi-Fi/internet, and the changes concerning the major importance of mixed zone operations in recent years. On this particular point, the Media Committee has agreed that Press Conferences at World Championships are no longer mandatory for Swimming events. This is due, from one hand, to the enlarged number of events in the programme (and consequent difficulty in bringing in the athletes in such a demanding schedule), and from the other hand, to the higher number of journalists taking quotes and doing interviews in the mixed zone. This area has therefore been constantly improved: Wi-Fi is now available, as well as working tables, TV monitors and in Windsor 2016 was created for the first time the concept of iZone. This is a "separated" area after the traditional mixed

zone, where journalists and athletes can seat and have a longer exchange – this is quite useful for "national" (3/4 journalists from the same country talking to one of their athletes) or "one-to-one" interviews.

AIPS PARTNERSHIP

During this period, FINA maintained its partnership with AIPS - the International Sports Press Association. Thanks to this partnership, four important fields are ensured: 1. The regular publication of FINA news in the AIPS magazine; 2. The presence of FINA representatives in the AIPS Congress; 3. The support of AIPS in declaring the bona fide of journalists applying for accreditation at major FINA events; 4. The organisation of an AIPS/FINA Young Reporters Programme at the 2014 FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) in Doha (QAT). This initiative was quite important, as it allowed young journalists from the five continents to know and be in contact with the FINA world and also permitted FINA to have additional original content during this competition.

FACILITIES COMMITTEE

INTRODUCTION

During the period 2013-2017 the Facilities Committee has been active fundamentally in the following four areas of action:

1) Collaboration and technical advice to FINA venues, particularly for the Olympic Games and World Championships.

2) The review and adaptation of the FINA Facilities Rules.

3) Participation at FINA conventions.

4) Technical advice requested by national federations, clubs, bodies and companies associated with swimming.

CHAPTER I

FINA VENUES

Over the last four years collaboration has taken place and advice has been given to the venues of the following FINA competitions:

- FINA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS KAZAN 2015
- RIO 2016 OLYMPIC GAMES
- FINA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS BUDAPEST 2017
- TOKYO 2020 OLYMPIC GAMES

Furthermore, during this period the Facilities Committee has worked with FINA's Development Department, FINA Olympic Solidarity, on the project for the renovation and adaptation of the Dakar Training Centre.

FINA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS KAZAN 2015

The organisers of the FINA World Championships Kazan 2015 faced the challenge of installing the competition and warm-up pools for swimming and synchronised swimming in the Field of Play of Kazan's football stadium, taking advantage of the stadium's operational areas and terracing.

The objective, therefore, of the Facilities Committee was to work with the Organising Committee, local technicians and FINA's Executive Management to successfully install the pools, arrange the temporary seating, and, by way of a complex structure, put a roof over the competition and spectator seating areas. We understand that the end result of locating the competition pool was a landmark in the history of swimming and lived up to the expectations of a World Championships.

We believe that the experience of Kazan 2015 falls within sustainability programmes in the planning of venues for major events, and that it opens up new horizons for future organisers.

Moreover, the Facilities Committee worked with the Organising Committee on the design and construction of the water polo and high diving venues, as well as on the upgrading of the Aquatics Palace diving tower to comply with FINA Rules.

The Facilities Committee held five work meetings in Kazan and drafted about thirty technical reports monitoring the design and the work.

RIO 2016 OLYMPIC GAMES

Rio 2016 had considered holding the Aquatics competition in three venues: the swimming and water polo finals in the New Aquatic Centre, holding 18,000 spectators, that was to be temporary; then, the diving and the synchronised swimming in the existing Maria Lenk pool. The water polo heats would be held in a redesigned pool adjacent to the Maracana Stadium, and the marathon in Copacabana Bay.

Throughout 2013, 2014, 2015 and 2016, several coordination meetings were held with the Rio Organising Committee, for the purpose of supervising in situ the progress of the design and construction of the venues.

As the date of the Olympic Games opening ceremony drew nearer, the initial expectations and demands decreased. This caused tension between FINA and the Organising Committee that came to a head with the Organising Committee that came to a head with the cancellation of the planned water polo venue, and with the refusal to roof, with a solution similar to Kazan 2015, the Maria Lenk pool. Finally, the figure of 18,000 spectators in the Aquatic Olympic Stadium was reduced to just over 13,000.

The water polo had to be held in the Maria Lenk pool, sharing spaces with the diving and synchronised swimming, logically having a challenging effect on the three disciplines.

All in all six work meetings were held in Rio and about eighty technical reports were issued related to the design and construction of the venues.

FINA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS BUDAPEST 2017

Right from the start, the Hungarian Government Agency, Centre of Key Government Investments, responsible for the construction of the New Aquatic Centre, and the Hungarian Swimming Federation, placed their complete trust in FINA to analyse the design of the Dagály Aquatic Centre that will host the swimming and diving events of the World Championships Budapest 2017.

The objective of all parties was to manage to build an Aquatic Centre to the highest competitive and organisational standards, and at the same time find a way of sustaining a sporting and financial Legacy.

With the contribution of an intelligent solution in relation to the temporary and permanent seating, all objectives were met within an extremely quick period of execution of 20 months. The eventual cost of the work was far below the budgets of similar Aquatic Centres built in this century.

The Facilities Committee carried out intensive monitoring of the design and the work, reflected in a monthly site visit and the exchange with the organisers and builders of around 80 emails with technical content relating to the Aquatic Centre.

The Dagály Aquatic Centre has been the first example of FINA's full participation and collaboration in the end design and construction of a FINA Venue. The experience may be considered a major point of reference for forthcoming aquatic centres and it creates expectations for it to be repeated in the future.

Moreover and always related to Budapest 2017, the Facilities Committee has monitored the design and construction of the synchronised swimming and high diving temporary venues.

TOKYO 2020 OLYMPIC GAMES

FINA and the Facilities Committee have already initiated contacts with Tokyo 2020 to coordinate and advise on the design of the New Aquatic Centre that is going to be built for the Olympic Games.

For this, three work meetings have already been held in Tokyo, in 2014, 2015 and 2016.

Throughout this period, Tokyo 2020 and the Facilities Committee have been in contact more than thirty times via email, exchanging opinions, solutions, and so on, in relation to the design of the Aquatic Centre. A delegation of the Japanese Swimming Federation and the architects of the Tokyo Metropolitan Government visited the Dagály Aquatic Centre in Budapest in February 2017, with the aim of obtaining, at first hand, technical ideas and solutions that could be applied to the Tokyo Aquatic Centre.

DAKAR TRAINING CENTRE

In 2015 and in coordination with FINA Olympic Solidarity, the Facilities Committee took part in the project to redesign the National Olympic Swimming Pool in Dakar (Senegal) with the aim of renovating it completely so that it may be used for development activities, scholarships and training camps for athletes, officials, trainers and administrators from the African continent.

CHAPTER II

FACILITIES RULES

During this period, the Facilities Committee, in close collaboration with the Technical Committees, has proceeded to carry out a thorough reading of the Facilities Rules for the purpose of improving the comprehension and interpretation of certain rules that posed interpretative loopholes.

At the same time, each of the changes that the committees have introduced in their own sports regulations, and which have had implications for the Facilities Rules, have been included.

All these proposals for change have been submitted to the FINA Bureau, to request their approval by the General Assembly at the next Congress in July 2017.

Simultaneously, and within the sphere of the Rules, *Compulsory Certificates of Approval* have been created for Olympic and World Championship swimming and diving pools.

These *Certificates* will in turn serve as a guide for those National Federations that wish to have recourse to them.

CHAPTER III

4th FINA WORLD AQUATICS CONVENTION

The Facilities Committee played an active part at the FINA Convention in Windsor (Canada) from 3 to 5 December 2016

The Committee presented the **"POOLS FOR ALL"** Project to the Convention. **"POOLS FOR ALL"** is a FINA project that offers standardised tools for the worldwide design, construction and operation of a complete range of sustainable aquatic facilities compliant with the regulations of its different aquatic disciplines.

CHAPTER IV

ADVICE

Throughout this period, the Facilities Committee has provided technical advice to many national federations, swimming clubs, bodies and companies associated with swimming.

The kinds of advice given have been very varied, from clarification about the interpretation of the Facilities Rules to the revision and correction of pool designs that did not comply with the Facilities Rules.

NATIONAL FEDERATIONS RELATIONS COMMITTEE Composition (as of May 2017):

The members have been dealing with matters related to the autonomy of the FINA Members, as the key instruments to give more independence and improve the efficiency of the statutes of the National Federations. The FINA National Federations Relations Committee have agreed with new proposals on the statutes related to the FINA Members' autonomy and independence.

The FINA National Federations Relations Committee has made special attention to the cases of government interferences in the Sri Lanka Swimming Association (SRI) and independence of the Kuwait Swimming Association (KUW). In the case of Sri Lanka, a FINA delegate was sent, as a representative of FINA, in order to inquiry and mediate the situation related on the ministry interferences to the rules and autonomy of the National Federation.

Furthermore, the Committee have attempted to activate the National Federations of Dominica (DMA), Cape Verde (CPV) and Micronesia (FSM), through FINA Delegates, with a specific knowledge on the field.

Last but not least, the members of the Committee have dealt with the request of termination membership from Tahiti (TAH), to be under the umbrella of the France (FRA).

The FINA National Federations Relations Committee met in Kazan (RUS) on July 25th 2015.

LEGAL COMMITTEE

The FINA Legal Committee has been very active since its creation. During its term of office 2013 – 2017, the Committee held six (6) meetings in person:

- on 10 January 2014 in Lausanne (SUI);
- on 1 December 2014 in Doha (QAT);
- on 25 July 2015 in Kazan (RUS);
- on 27 November 2015 in Lausanne (SUI);
- on 4 November 2016 in Lausanne (SUI);
- on 3 December 2016 in Windsor (CAN).

The FINA Legal Committee was also frequently consulted through emails on various matters, which required high and extensive legal expertise.

Legislation

The FINA Legal Committee reviewed and redacted proposals for amendments to the FINA Constitution received from the FINA Bureau, FINA Committees, FINA Panels and FINA Member Federations. Those amendments were presented for approval at the Extraordinary Congress in Doha (QAT) in December 2014; the General Congress in Kazan (RUS) in July 2015 and the General Congress in Budapest (HUN) in July 2017.

Furthermore, the FINA Legal Committee reviewed the new FINA Doping Control Rules 2015 regarding their compliance with the amended World Anti-Doping Code 2015. The FINA Legal Committee fully supported the creation and implementation of the FINA Rules on the Prevention of the Manipulation of Competitions

Finally, the Committee proposed a revision of BL 12 regarding FINA's sanction of international competitions and establishment of the FINA World Aquatic Calendar.

Administrative review of whereabouts failures

The FINA Legal Committee played an important role in fulfilling obligations and strictly applying the doping control rules, as adopted by the sport community in the World Anti-Doping Code, and the respective International Standards for Testing and Investigations.

In accordance with article I.5.2 of the WADA International Standards for Testing and Investigations and the results management process in respect of an apparent missed test or an apparent filing failure, an athlete has the right to an administrative review of a decision issued by the respective anti-doping organisation recording alleged whereabouts failure against this athlete. Such administrative reviews shall be conducted by a designee who was not involved in the previous assessment of the alleged whereabouts failure.

Administrative reviews were conducted by the FINA Legal Committee and were based on written submission presented by athletes. Such review guaranteed that the rights of athletes were fully respected and any wrongful decisions were corrected immediately without necessity of formal appeals to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS).

Sport nationality

The FINA Legal Committee interpreted on several occasions the FINA Rules on sport nationality due to different cases of change of sport nationality.

At the end of the office term, the members of the FINA Legal Committee agreed to amend the FINA Rule GR 2.5 and clarify FINA Rule GR 2.6. The Committee agreed to amend FINA Rule GR 2.5 as follows: "This choice (to choose the sport nationality by competitors with dual citizenship) shall be exercised by the first representation of the competitor for one (1) of the countries".

In addition, the members agreed with the clarifications on the residency and Club jurisdiction conditions. Related to the residency condition (FINA rule GR 2.6), it was agreed that a competitor shall be based and have his/her residency in the new country for the 12 months period as the "certified residency". The competitor shall be "living and sleeping", as the "real and effective residency" in the new country for the majority of days of the year (i.e. + 182 days). Related to the club jurisdiction (FINA Rule GR 2.6.2 indent 1), it was agreed that a competitor shall participate with the new club of the new National Federation for the 12 months period. The competitor cannot participate with a club of another country during the 12 months period.

National Federations matters

In general, the FINA Legal Committee revised and advised on various Constitutions and By-Laws of National Federations. Also the Committee advised on internal disputes of National Federations.

As an emerging and relevant issue, the Committee considered the consequences of the suspended National Federations by FINA. To sum up, the Committee agreed with a list of consequences, which did not affect the participation of the athletes in competitions.

Furthermore, in relation to the board of directors of the National Federations, the members agreed that in principle the directors of the National Federations shall not be entitled to vote at the elections of the same National Federations.

Miscellaneous

During its terms the FINA Legal Committee faced and analysed unauthorized relations from external sport organisations. On the application of the FINA Rules, the members successfully dissipated those unauthorized relations.

Following the FINA President's proposal, the members agreed with the creation of the Continental Aquatics Coaches Association.

Last but not least, the members advised FINA on the following matters: good governance, data privacy, electronic signature of legal documents, etc.

SWIMWEAR APPROVAL COMMITTEE


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Chairman: Jan-Anders Mansson (SWE) **Members:** Bruce Mason (AUS), David Pendergast (USA), Shigehiro Takahashi (JPN) The FINA Swimwear Approval Committee (SAC) executes the process of swimwear approval according to the FINA rules in force (FINA Requirements for Swimwear Approval - FRSA). The SAC follows and studies the development of swimwear materials, and communicates with swimwear manufacturers during the approval process.

The FINA Swimwear Approval Committee has been created in 2009. In the initial phase, between 2009 and 2013, SAC's activities were focused on establishing an efficient management system for SAC, allowing for a clear and systematic approval process. The current period, 2013 to 2017, has been dedicated to a consolidation of the approval process and fine-tuning of the testing procedures.

The number of swimsuits submitted over the years is fairly constant. Some fluctuations related to the cycle of the Olympic Games can however be observed, i.e. there is an increase in the number of items submitted during the year before Olympics (2011, 2015) which is linked to the approval validity. The amount of swimwear samples submitted and approved since the creation of the SAC can be seen in this table:



During the past four years, there have been no major changes in the rules or in the approval procedures that could cause an undesired performance impact. However, some minor adjustments have been done with the objective to enhance the manufacturability of swimsuits. Furthermore, a limitation of the number of seams used in the construction of swimsuits has been introduced in order to reduce unreasonable high compression of the swimmer's body or reduction of the overall permeability of the suit.

At the time of the establishment of this document, I can report that I do not foresee any potential performance-impacting materials or designs which could destabilise the pool swimsuits during the coming year. However, it will be important to pay a close attention on the introduction of wetsuits for FINA Open Water Competitions during the year 2017 in order to ensure a coherent and secure approach to both, the ruling and the judgment of wetsuits. Indeed, the complexity of wetsuits has to be controlled and fairly judged in order to safeguard the level playing field of open water swimming while allowing an interest for the manufacturing industry to invest in FINA open water apparel.



Besides the three annual SAC meetings, the Committee also organises one annual meeting with the swimwear manufacturers. The purpose of this meeting is to facilitate the communication regarding decisions and clarifications related to the approval process. It also serves as an excellent forum for exchange of ideas and opinions leading to a positive evolution of the sport of swimming.

Finally, I'm pleased to report an excellent interaction and coop-

eration with the swimwear manufactures. It made the SAC Members' collaboration with swimwear industry a pure pleasure. I would also like to express a sincere appreciation for the contribution of the SAC Members, as well as for the dedicated work of Ms. Klincewicz and Mr. Medvedev who have managed an important and sometimes challenging work in a very professional manner. They played an important role in the interface between the manufacturers and the SAC Members facilitating the interactions and communications

DOPING CONTROL REVIEW BOARD

INTRODUCTION

The DCRB is composed of individuals with distinguished experience in analytical sciences, sports medicine and administration of doping control programmes.

The Bureau liaison, very supportive of DCRB activities, has been Erik Van Heijningen (Netherlands)

Routine Activities of the DCRB – Test Planning and Reviews:

The FINA Doping Control programme involves competitors identified as members of the FINA Registered Testing Pool (RTP). An exhaustive Doping Risk Assessment Report of Aquatics competitors is underway and the DCRB will lead the development of appropriate FINA anti-doping policy using this as the reference. When deemed appropriate, cases have been forwarded as "Adverse Analytical Findings" (AAF) to the FINA Doping Panel for further adjudication. Although testing of non-RTP FINA competitors is the responsibility of National Anti-doping Organisations (NADOs) or the organisers of other competitions, DCRB has reviewed AAF findings from this group.

Routine Activities of the DCRB – Therapeutic Use Exemptions:

The DCRB has carefully scrutinised all therapeutic use exemption applications for permission to use otherwise prohibited substances for the treatment of legitimate illness or injuries (TUE). This process has been guided by the document "International Standard for Therapeutic Use Exemptions" and guidelines established by the WADA Therapeutic Use Exemption Committee (WADA TUEC). Since October 2016, DCRB has engaged Dr. David Gerrard (FINA SMC Vice Chairman, WADA TUEC Chairman) to chair the FINA TUEC working in collaboration with the Physician members of the DCRB.

The Athlete Biological Passport (ABP) Programme:

In the reported period 2013-2017, FINA has extended the Athlete Biological Passport (ABP) programme, aiding the identification of doping practices via the detection of changes in biological markers indicative of doping practices. The programme, originally introduced in swimming, has been expanded to include competitors in other aquatic disciplines. DCRB has relied on the Athlete Management Passport Unit (APMU) of the Lausanne laboratory to provide a rapid response to concerning results. The suggestions provided by the APMU have been included in the new "Intelligent" strategy (see below) informing anti-doping practice.

DCRB at the FINA World Championships:

During the reporting period, DCRB has closely supervised doping control at the FINA short course (Doha 2014 and Windsor 2016) and long course (Barcelona 2013, Kazan 2015, preparation of Budapest 2017) World Championships. The DCRB had direct oversight of sample taking procedures in these events, and on FINA's behalf, also sent two supervising laboratory experts to the Moscow laboratory during the Kazan 2015 championships. In addition, stored samples from the Kazan championships have been re-analysed following the findings of the McLaren reports on Russian malpractices, despite the Kazan Championships not being implicated in these reports. The long-term storage of samples from FINA World Championships for eventual retesting is now routine.

After the initial McLaren report revealed evidence of Russian manipulation of samples prior the Rio Olympics, the DCRB strongly recommended to FINA that it should adhere to the blanket ban of the Russian team. The DCRB at that time worked exhaustively to gather the appropriate information prior to coming to this decision. The recommendation was not implemented and this generated great concern amongst members of the Board and ultimately the resignation of three DCRB members. The DCRB would like to expressly thank Professor Andrew Pipe, Dr Susan White and Dr Larry Bowers for their many years of hard work and dedication to the DCRB of FINA and their commitment to the Anti-doping cause. The current DCRB is committed to closely cooperating with WADA to ensure further analysis of available Russian relevant samples.

The WADA Code 2015 and Intelligent Testing:

The introduction of the 2015 WADA Code afforded a significant opportunity for sporting organisations to re-examine their anti-doping programmes and practices. FINA has been seen as a remarkable International Federation in terms of the delivery of its anti-doping programmes. DCRB members have participated in meetings with WADA, the IOC, NADO's and International Federations with the aim of improving communication and coordination.

The 2015 WADA Code placed an emphasis on the development of "intelligent testing" processes. DCRB considers that "intelligent testing" strategies require FINA to be able to identify unexpected improvements in sporting performance; the emergence of novel doping products; doping concerns in certain communities or knowledge derived from liaison with civil authorities. Other strategies include the development and delivery of educational programmes, increasing collaboration of doping control activities among anti-doping organisations, the prosecution of those who facilitate doping practices, and the meticulous construction and timing of doping control testing strategies. The DCRB

will supervise the inclusion of these strategies in the FINA anti-doping control programme.

CONCLUSION

The DCRB provides FINA with high-level expertise from a range of perspectives including scientific, clinical and administrative. The DCRB has also received support from FINA staff (especially Cornel Marculescu, Johan Lefebvre, Katarzyna Jozwik. and Kyung Eon Lee) and is deeply committed to ensuring that the FINA anti-doping programme continues to evolve so as to ensure that it is seen as ethical, best-practice and world-leading. Therefore, the DCRB will continue to lobby for the expansion of the FINA doping control staff, which will allow the careful examination of current testing programmes, further development of an "intelligencebased" testing programme, consolidation of the ABP programme in all FINA disciplines, development of strategic partnerships with other anti-doping organisations, and the development of integrated educational programmes in association with other anti-doping organisations.

DOPING PANEL

Composition (as of May 2017):



Chairman: Robert Fox (SUI) **Members:** Farid Ben Belkacem (ALG), William Bock (USA), Raymond Hack (RSA), Peter Kerr (AUS), Toshiro Ueyanagi (JPN) The FINA Doping Panel since 2013 and for the period ending in July 2017 has seen an increase in the affairs which it had to handle. There were a little less than 30 cases over this period of time, and most cases involved athletes having tested positive for various prohibited substances. There were two cases involving EPO and the majority of the cases which were dealt with during 2016 were relevant to Meldonium.

The FINA Doping Panel takes pride in the fact that a vast majority of the decisions which it rendered were accepted by the athletes, and among the few which were disputed before the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS), only one was overturned and it was specifically mentioned in the decision that this was due to facts which were presented only before the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS), but were unknown to the FINA Doping Panel. Importantly, there was no decision which was annulled or modified on grounds of a violation of the right to a fair trial, or the fundamental rights of the athletes. This means that the procedural rules by which the FINA Doping Panel function are sound and ensure that the athletes have a fair day in court, or if they decide not to request a hearing, they are given an adequate chance to present their case.

As it is aware of the ever evolving fight against doping, in its most recent meetings, the FINA Doping Panel discussed various topics, usually focalising on past decisions and ways to improve its functioning. In order to maintain a sound level of competence and knowledge, a meeting was held in Windsor Canada with two representatives of the FINA Doping Control Review Board in which the Doping Panel was given by these representatives a presentation regarding the biological passport. This tool has become increasingly important in the fight against doping in sports and the FINA Doping Panel felt it useful not only to acquire some basic information on this subject, but also use this as an opportunity to reinforce its ties with another FINA committee it is called upon to work with. The meeting achieved both goals and both committee representatives hope to encourage this type of meeting in the future.

DISCIPLINARY PANEL

Composition (as of May 2017):



Chairman: Dr. Christa Thiel (GER) **Members:** Chris Fydler (AUS), Li Hua (CHN), Jane Njeri Onyango (KEN), David Sparkes (GBR), Bruce Stratton (USA) The members of the FINA Disciplinary Panel dealt with several disciplinary cases forwarded from the FINA Executive during its term of office from 2013-2017.

In 2014, the FINA Executive forwarded to the Chairman of the FINA Disciplinary Panel a case of sport nationality for consideration and investigation. Afterwards a warning was sent to the athlete and the National Federation, as a decision from the FINA Office.

The FINA Disciplinary Panel conducted disciplinary proceedings in 2015 against two coaches in swimming. The Panel decided that the coaches were ineligible to apply for a FINA accreditation until January 2017, having committed an infringement of article 2 (a) of the FINA Code of Conduct.

In 2016 the Panel dealt with another case of change of sport nationality, where two athletes and the National Federation were involved. The National Federation was fined with the costs of FINA for the proceedings; and the two athletes were sanctioned with a period of ineligibility for eight months to compete.

During the last year of office, three cases of potential infringement of change of sport nationality rules were forwarded to the FINA Disciplinary Panel by the FINA Executive. The two first cases were addressed by the Panel with the decision that the National Federations received a warning and cover the costs of proceedings of FINA. The third case is still pending.

The members of the Disciplinary Panel met in person on several occasions, especially in Kazan (Russia) in 2015 and Windsor (Canada) in 2016. At the meetings the Disciplinary Panel discussed current international cases with their outcome and inference to FINA. Furthermore the matters of change of sport nationality was raised as this field required special attention.

The FINA Disciplinary Panel forwarded proposals for the change of the Constitution and the proceedings of the Panel.

Special thanks are going to the Legal Department of the FINA Office for the professional support to the Panel and especially the Chairman. Many thanks also to my colleagues of the Panel for their work and dedication.

At the end it is stated that all decisions of the Panel were final and FINA had no appeal to CAS.

ETHICS PANEL

Composition (as of May 2017):



Chairman: Gunnar Werner (SWE) **Members:** Abdulla Al Hayyan (KUW), Abron Deguenon (BEN), Jean Gay (SUI), Ian Hunt (NZL), William Hybl (USA) The first FINA Ethics Panel was created by the FINA Bureau as an ad hoc committee (FINA Rule C 19.2) on 22 February 2013 in order to deal with any matters regarding the elections in July 2013 as well as all other ethical issues. At the same time the first FINA Code of Ethics was approved by the FINA Bureau.

The first meeting with the ad hoc Panel took place in Geneva (SUI) on 3 July 2013, in which the role of the Panel in general was discussed and established. With reference to the first FINA Code of Ethics of 22 February 2013 the meeting finished with a request of final confirmation and appointment of the three remaining members of the Panel by the newly elected FINA Bureau at its first meeting in Barcelona (ESP). In Barcelona the newly elected FINA Bureau confirmed the Panel and appointed three additional members of the Panel.

The first meeting with the Panel after having been confirmed by the FINA Bureau took place in Lausanne (SUI) on 28 January 2014. The main issue for the meeting was to review and prepare proposals for amendments to the FINA Constitution and the current Code of Ethics to the FINA Extraordinary Congress in Doha (QAT) in December 2014. The working procedure in the Panel was also established.

Ordinary meetings with the Panel have thereafter been held on January 17th, 2015, in Lausanne (SUI), July 26th 2015, in Kazan (RUS) and December 4th and 5th 2016, in Windsor (CAN). At the December 2016 meetings two issues of importance were dealt with. Firstly two complaints filed by Mr. Paolo Barelli (ITA) against Mr. Husain Al Musallam (KUW) and Mr. Dale Neuburger (USA), which were transferred to the FINA Executive in accordance with FINA Rule C 24.5 except for that the Panel on request by the Executive held a hearing with Mr. Husain Musallam on the matter. Secondly a new proposal of amendments to the FINA Constitution including a new role of the Ethics Panel as Nomination Committee (new FINA Rules C 24.12 and C 24.13), which would mean a significant increase of the responsibilities of the Panel.

MESSAGE FROM THE FINA HONORARY TREASURER



Honorary Treasurer Pipat Paniangvait (THA)

To the FINA Member Federations and To the FINA Bureau Members and Honorary Members

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the pleasure to present to you hereafter the Treasurer's financial report for the four-year period ending December 2016, including the auditors "Report to the General Congress on the verification of the four years 2013-2016 financial statements" in agreement with FINA's Constitution Rule C 25.2. This report is expected to be included on the Agenda of the FINA General Congress as per our Constitution rule C 15.12.3.

The Financial Statements which comprise the balance sheet, income statement, cash flow statement and notes, for the four-year period ended 31 December 2016 were audited by FINA's auditors, PricewaterhouseCoopers which recommends their approval. The report consists of an aggregate of audited financial statements for the years 2013, 2014, 2015 and 2016 approved by the Bureau compared to the aggregate of the years 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2012, approved by the Congress and reclassified for comparison purposes.

Please find below a short summary of the main events and activities which had a financial impact during this four-year term.

FINANCIAL IMPACT OF THE YEARS 2013-2016

The success and the increasing notoriety of FINA's various Events and Competitions over this fouryear period as well as the development of new activities had a positive impact on its financial statements. FINA World Championships and FINA World Swimming Championships are running on a two years basis;

 FINA World Junior Championships run in all disciplines and FINA Youth Water Polo Championships (UA18);

 The FINA World Aquatics Convention is held every two years in conjunction with the FINA Medical Congress and the FINA Gold Clinic;

 Particular attention has been brought to the FINA Development programmes:

- Additional schools;
- Allocation of Scholarship grants
- Target Rio Programme
- Continental Championships subsidies

 Increased financial support to Federations to attend FINA's events and other contributions;
 Increased athletes support through enhanced prize monies and medical insurance while competing at FINA events.

FINA's Income and Expenditures statement for this period met the forecasted expectations despite of the negative worldwide economic conditions and low return on financials. To remember that at the beginning of the year 2015 the European currency lost approximately 20% of its value against the Swiss francs; the US dollars hit a bottom line during the same period, ending around parity against the Swiss Francs at current year end. Revenues generated by licensing television broadcasting rights and sponsorships though impacted by the loss in value, remained steady and confirmed the positive impact of running World Championships every 2 years.

FINA's preserved and consolidated its financial assets thanks to prudent assets management. This fouryear period is marked by the high value of the Swiss Francs against all other currencies, negative interests on long-term placements and decreased return on marketable securities. In general the performances offered by the financial markets were poor. Considering the expected growth of FINA's activities over the next years and the difficulties encountered by the world's economies, the target for next four-year period will be to assess the Federation's financial structure and to protect its existence against unforeseen events or economic impacts. The consolidation of FINA's financials will ensure that regular resources are available to support the different FINA projects.

As for financial aspects, our aim is to generate excess funds in order to invest in Aquatics activities worldwide and to secure the organization financial structure against any unexpected situation.

FINA managed to create a reserve for future Championships as an insurance to cover a draw back. At the end of the four-year period, funds were earmarked for the creation of an anti-doping foundation and for the Development and educational activities.

As a non-profit making association ruling under the Swiss law, FINA is deemed to redistribute its income. A glance on the financials shows that the excess of Income over expenditure at the end of this four-year period is mainly due to the IOC share of Television and Sponsorship rights received in relation with the Olympic Games.

FINA ACTIVITIES

ADMINISTRATION

FINA is a non-governmental association established under Swiss law with headquarters located in Lausanne, Switzerland. As a non-profit-making association, it operates under the rules of the Swiss Civil code (CC60ss).

General Administration costs

Computer services

These services are designed to serve FINA within its daily activities and recorded under General Administration costs. Within the four-year period specific attention was given to the launch of new applications in line with the actual technologies.

General Management System - GMS:

The administration costs include the GMS launched in 2014, a web-based platform, owned and managed by FINA, allowing the FINA Family, FINA Member Federations and FINA Event Organisers to administrate, organise, operate and archive FINA events. Additional developments included the invoicing for registration and accommodation purposes, rankings and results of competitions.

FINA Website and branding

The site was fully redesigned and rebuilt and bears yearly development and maintenance plans. The hosting servers were upgraded and a Content Delivery Network (CDN) was put in place.

Youtube

Development of the FINA Youtube channels – contents strategy, channel optimization, rights management.

FINA Mobile Apps

A FINA Mobile App was developed to be the official results and news application for Aquatic Sports; it brings all the FINA's results, news and social media posts to one place and enables to keep updated with all actions from the different FINA competitions.

The App encloses also features to discover the athletes, in depth results, and keeps up with the latest news and videos directly on the smartphone.

Electronic Data Management

FINA acquired an Electronic Data Management system liaised with the accounting software; as such, all invoices and payment details are easily accessible; extension of the EDM system to other Departments and to existing archives is planned for the year 2017.

FINA Headquarters

The project which started in 2010 was successfully completed in 2016 with FINA moving into its new Headquarters at the end of September 2016. The Construction itself lasted 20 Months which was below the forecasted duration. The construction of the new building and the renovation of the Historical building was kept in line with the allocated budget.

The total costs is in line with other Real Estate Market. General Maintenance costs compared to rental costs for similar area will leave a comfortable margin depreciation.

At this occasion, FINA equipped its offices with new furniture and electronical equipment.

Payroll

FINA invested in new staff positions with the opening of a new Events Management Department, dealing essentially with the GMS, the General Management System launched in 2014 at the occasion of the 12th FINA World Swimming Championships and 3rd FINA Aquatics Convention 2014 and reinforcing other Departments.

In its daily activities, FINA works very closely with third parties service providers, such as:

Financials

As per FINA Constitution, the financial planning, the supervision of income and expenditure, the budget and the financial statements established on a yearly basis and the four-year statements are under the Honorary Treasurer's responsibility.

The Honorary Treasurer is in close contact with the Accounting Department to fulfil his duties of controlling and coordinating the financial aspects of FINA's activities:

- Budgets;
- Cash-flow movements;
- Treasury and investment guidelines
- Expenditure and Income ledgers;
- Review of Bureau approved budget against accounting ledgers;
- Follow up of accounts receivable ledger;
- Regular contacts with the Executives Members, the FINA Executive Director and FINA's Permanent Office on financial aspects raised by the Office;
- Liaise with the auditors and the FINA Finance Committee.

Treasury and investment policies

- FINA is establishing new guidelines for its investments activities, following the principles of assets allocation rules set for Pension funds, which remains very conservative and security oriented. Assets are held at different banks and discretionary management agreements shall be confirmed.
- Considering the markets activities of the past years, funds have been invested on derivatives and structured products in order to generate some financial income. Bonds were sold prior maturity at market rate above nominal value and reinvested on new opportunities.
- Funds cashed in during the period were invested in short term currency structured products and will be re-invested in marketable securities as soon as the financial market offers reasonable opportunities.
- A lombard loan was taken up to consolidated the needs of local currency while financing the construction of the new FINA Headquarters; this tool enabled a smooth financial planning of the needs in Swiss Francs over the period; the loan was fully reimbursed at the end of the period considered.
- To run and control the investing activities, FINA acquired a consolidation and analysis tool. As such, FINA management has a consolidated overview of

the financial activities; a comparative and consolidated overview of individual performances, a consolidated overview from a risk perspective and control over the financial activities budgets.

Foreign currencies

This financial period has seen a strengthening of the reporting currency (Swiss Francs) against all other currencies resulting in a financial exchange loss over the period.

Transactions in foreign currencies are converted according to the exchange rates prevailing at transaction date. At year-end, monetary assets and liabilities are converted to the reporting currency at year end rate, resulting in an unrealized exchange loss or gain.

Exchange rates at the close of year:

The guarantees are either deposited on a bank account in the name of FINA or covered by a bank guarantee issued in FINA's favour by a first class bank.

Restricted and unrestricted operating funds

FINA's equity consists of "Reserves and funds" which are restricted in their use and "unrestricted operating funds".

As an association, FINA's Income and Expenditure Statement have to be in adequacy with the objectives set out in the Constitution. As a non-profit making organisation, the equity has to be reinvested in activities which promote FINA's objectives.

In this perspective, FINA set up reserves to cover against unexpected financial draw backs, as an "auto" insurance and funds for Development purposes.

Accounts receivable

Accounts receivable are registered at the closing rate value. As per FINA policy, any unsettled amount at the time of audit with impact on "Expenditure and Income statement" is fully depreciated.

Prepaid expenses and deferred Income

Expenses paid in advance on forthcoming events or Income received in advance for future events are brought to balance sheet at historic costs until event occurrence.

Events "prepaid assets" are mainly marketing commissions paid or accounted for on deferred income and travel costs paid for Events taking place at the beginning of the financial year.

"Deferred income" is income earmarked for a specific Event or competition and is, as per contract schedule, received prior Event occurrence from broadcasters, sponsors and Host Cities. Deferred income is only taken to Income after completion of the Event.

Guarantees

Host Federations and / or Events organisers are contractually requested to provide a deposit as financial guarantee in relation to the Event.

FINA EVENTS

The organization of FINA's events follow a calendar approved by the FINA Bureau. Cities/ Federations who wish to organise an event undergo bidding procedures and are nominated by the Bureau.

The **FINA World Aquatics Convention** which aims to bring together the global aquatics industry to fast track the development of the 5 x aquatic sports discipline, was held in 2014 and 2016 in conjunction with the FINA Gold Clinic, the Medical Congress and the "Soirée des Etoiles, reward for the best athletes and followed by the FINA World Swimming Championships.

The organisation of the **FINA World Championships 2015** was quite challenging as the **FINA Masters World Championships** were organized for the first time in continuity of the World Championships.

Over the period, the FINA Bureau members, technical delegates and commission members met for at least once per year and at the occasion of FINA Events or other Meetings.













Athletes prize monies over the period





In line with the FINA Constitution, Development activities are specific programmes to promote and encourage the development of Aquatics in all possible regards throughout the world. The FINA Development Programme for the period 2013-2016 covered:

FINA Clinics

Clinics for all FINA disciplines were organised throughout the continents. FINA came up for expenses relating to lecturers including travel, hotel and per diem as well as for a fixed amount for participants and the host federation organisation costs.

FINA / Olympic Solidarity clinics

Objectives of the Olympic Solidarity Programmes are to encourage the development of sport in countries where opportunities for improvement do not normally exist. Various FINA - Olympic Solidarity Clinics were held over the continents; the Olympic Solidarity reimburses the lecturer's travel costs and per diem directly to FINA whereas other related costs are dealt with through the NOC.

Certification programmes

The purpose of these courses is to offer to Aquatics officials and swimming coaches around the world the possibility to be acknowledged as certified swimming coach or official and to offer recognition for the work they have accomplished.

Schools

FINA schools for Officials, available within each continental region for each of FINA's Aquatics disciplines, are intended to provide training and certification to judges and referees in all aquatic disciplines. The purpose of FINA Schools is to increase the number of officials and enhance the quality of officiating; create uniform interpretation and application of rules across all aquatic disciplines and raise the quality of refereeing.

Scholarships and Targeting Rio

This programme aims to help the FINA National Federation members, and more concretely their athletes to qualify for their participation in the FINA World Championships. FINA provided assistance in form of grants to the scholarship holders to train in designated high-level training center/environment or support his/her FINA National Federation (NF).

Target Rio: The programme Targeting Rio offered the opportunity to obtain financial and technical assistance for two potential elites athletes per National Federation from the Southeast Asian Region to qualify for the Olympic Games.

Scholarships: The scholarship programme offers the opportunity to obtain financial and technical assistance for one athlete to qualify for the FINA major event of the year.

FINA Gold Medal Swimming Coaches Clinic


The FINA Gold Medal Swimming Coaches Clinic were run in 2014 (Doha) and 2016 (Windsor) as a separate event in liaison with the FINA World Aquatics Convention. The purpose of this event is to enable swimming coaches to meet and to exchange ideas, experience and knowledge. FINA provided for 1 delegate per Federation, travel, accommodation and Convention pass.

Video DVD Programme

Videotapes and DVD were produced after each major event for development purposes and were sent free of charge to all FINA Member Federations, Bureau and Standing Committee Members. Specific videos/DVD in relation to the Development programme were also produced over the period.

Continental Championships Support

The main objective of this programme part is to support the organisation of Continental Competitions organised by the Continental Aquatics Associations. By offering financial assistance to the Continental associations FINA aims to promote the organisation of competitions that will enable the athletes and Federations to compete in the FINA Events.

<u>Activity</u>

The Fédération Internationale de Natation (FINA), with legal status as an association in accordance with article 60 ff of the Swiss Civil Code, is the world governing body for the sport of Aquatics; its headquarters are located in Lausanne, Switzerland.

The main objectives of FINA are to promote and encourage the development of Aquatics in all possible manifestations throughout the world, to provide fair and drug free sport, to promote and encourage the development of international relations, to encourage participation in Aquatic disciplines at all levels throughout the world regardless of age, gender or race, to organise World Championships and other FINA competitions, to adopt necessary uniform rules and regulations and to hold competitions in Swimming, Open Water Swimming, Diving, High Diving, Water Polo, Synchronised Swimming and Masters, to encourage the increase of facilities for Aquatic's disciplines throughout the world with the support of other interested parties and to carry out such other activities as may be desirable to promote the sport.

- Summary of significant accounting policies
- .1 Basis of accounting

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of commercial accounting as set out in the Swiss Code of Obligations (Art. 957 to 963b CO, effective since 1st January 2013). Significant balance sheet items are accounted for as follows:

.2 Short term deposits and derivatives

Term deposits are deposits held in currencies other than Swiss Francs and valued at exchange rates ruling at year-end.

Structured products are short term deposits including derivative financial instruments to hedge exposure against currency fluctuations. At year end these deposits are valued at fair value, being the market value on balance sheet date of the quoted structured product.

.3 Marketable securities

Marketable securities are valued on an item by item basis at the lower of costs and market values.

.4 Deferred income, prepaid expenses and other current assets

Any funds received for events to be held in the future or invoiced on a contractual basis, where reimbursement of these funds would be necessary in the case of event cancellation, are deferred in the balance sheet and not recognized as income until the event for which the funds were received has taken place. Costs incurred for future events are capitalized within "Prepaid expenses and other current assets" and are amortized in line with the recognition of the related revenue. Deferred income is recorded applying the exchange rate prevailing on the date of invoicing. Provision has been recorded where FINA's liability has increased due to exchange rate fluctuation.

Notes to the financial statements for the four-year period 2013-2016

2.5 Accounting for foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities denominated in currencies other than Swiss francs are recorded based on exchange rates ruling at the year-end. Transactions denominated in other than Swiss francs are recorded at average rates for the year. All exchange losses and realized exchange gains are recognized in the statement of income and expenditure.

Unrealized exchange gains are deferred and recognized under current liabilities.

2.6 Provision for doubtful accounts

Provision is made for accounts whose collection is considered by management to be uncertain; this is described as provision for doubtful accounts in the financial statements.

2.7 Off balance sheet items and guarantees

Over the period a guarantee of CHF 650 000 was issued by the bank Julius Baer in relation with the acquisition of real estate property for FINA headquarters. This acquisition option had been extended to December 2013, where FINA finalised the acquisition of the property.

A rent guarantee letter had been issued by UBS Switzerland SA as a guarantee for the rent of the FINA temporary offices in Lausane. This guarantee was cancelled ad the end of December 2016.
